A Message from Rabbi Roz and Cantor Jen on Finding Comfort and Healing in the Midst of a Pandemic

i shebeirach avoteinu
M'kor hab'rachah l'imoteinu
May the source of strength,
Who blessed the ones before us,
Help us find the courage to make our lives a blessing,
And let us say, Amen.

Mi shebeirach imoteinu M'kor hab'rachah l'avoteinu Bless those in need of healing with r'fuah sh'leimah, The renewal of body, the renewal of spirit, And let us say, Amen.

It has been 27 years since Debbie Friedman wrote these words and the accompanying cherished melody to the prayer for healing, *Mi Shebeirach*. In that time, perhaps no other in our liturgy is more beloved . . . or more powerful. When we offer up the names of loved ones and friends struggling with illness and follow them with this communal plea, not only do we feel that God hears our prayers, but also, offering them as one congregation united in faith and hope uplifts and strengthens us. Friedman's *Mi Shebeirach* reminds us that we are not alone in our concern, in our pain; rather God and our community are with us in this difficult moment along our life's journey.

Debbie Friedman said just this when she was asked about why she wrote the prayer. She answered, "For each of us, something is not right. And yet, in life there is so much compassion and love . . . That's the joy of it all. . . You can't take the pain away, for God's sake. You can't pretend it's not there. You can't say you don't have what you have. We're going to have these afflictions for however long we live and we're going to have to learn how to manage for as long as we live . . . like Jacob wrestling with the angel only to walk away limping, but healed . . . Yes, we may be injured. We may be hurting. We may be broken, but it's only our body, our soul is whole." Friedman recognized that with all of the suffering in the world and in our own lives, there is more human kindness and hope than there is fear and uncertainty.

As you are reading these words, we are about six weeks into the COVID-19 pandemic here in

Hampton Roads, and a month or so into Governor Northam's Shelterin-Place order. By now many of us know someone -- whether family member, friend or acquaintance, community leader or public figure -- who has contracted the

virus. And, if we are so fortunate not to, we see the carnage on the news 24/7. It is almost too much to bear

Yet while we await a cure, we have managed to find ways of mustering faith and sharing comfort and healing. We have gathered twice weekly for Shabbat to pray as a community; anchored in our ancient tradition, we have been bolstered by our familiar prayers and the knowledge that we are all worshipping together. Even though we cannot see one another, we feel each other's presence and that of God among us as well. It was so during our beautiful Seder, our meaningful bi-weekly Torah Study, our D'Bar Torah program for young adults, and our Wiggles & Giggles for young children. Weekly, we add offerings -- a Mussar group for our women, a course on how to live in this time of the virus and how Jewish wisdom can guide us . . . We invite you to join us in any or all of these moments of gathering together in sacred community. It really does help.

For Debbie Friedman, as for us, it is possible to find healing even without being fully cured, to be comforted even while we are bereft, to be strengthened even when we feel incredibly fragile. May it continue to be so for us. Amen. \$\phi\$

We're Reworking and Re-imagining OST

he challenges presented by COVID-19 on life at Ohef Sholom Temple are vast and complicated.

Knowing we aren't alone in reconfiguring our Shabbat Services, programs, Religious School, building operations, staffing,

and the general business of the board, doesn't make it any easier as we wade through these uncharted and unsettling waters.

In an effort to be prepared on all fronts, we formed a Crisis Management Team in mid-March. This group of smart, wise, and caring congregants is helping guide us through these demanding days. We meet weekly to deal with a variety of issues and to uncover every hurdle for conducting Temple business that might be lurking. From producing a balanced budget in uncertain times to determining how to hold the Annual Meeting (OST's bylaws are very specific about time and place), to managing ideas for how OST can assist our congregants and the community, we've discussed options, developed solutions, and engaged others to help.

We've all heard the phrase 'unprecedented times' umpteen times, but it's true. Nearly every aspect of Ohef Sholom must be reworked and re-imagined. While we're all doing our best to maintain the level of excellence that we're accustomed to for our congregation, it's not an easy task and I'm grateful for everyone – board members and volunteers, clergy, and staff, who have stepped forward to find and implement new ways of conducting OST's daily life, and especially for those who swiftly secured our SBA Loan.

Not accustomed to cancelling events, we've rescheduled many, including Confirmation, which will take place in October.

We're zooming and streaming and gaining participants and audiences. It's certainly not the same as being in Sinai Chapel with Rabbi,

Cantor, Chuck, and our fabulous choir, but Shabbat Services via Zoom have created a new way to be a community. It is heartwarming and even fun to see congregants' comments and reactions on Facebook during Services. And, our *Seder* was outstanding! Watching all of the screens popping up and everyone waving and greeting each other with such big smiles was a holiday highlight for many.

Our programs have shifted, too. We've added some, such as *D'Bar Torah*, and changed how we do others. *Mitzvah Day* was postponed and our monthly Soup Kitchen put on hold, but we've launched **Love Thy Neighbor**, an effort to lend a hand to those in need during this crisis – nurses and first responders, hungry neighbors, and our own congregants who require assistance. If you are able to help this mighty band of congregants, please contact Dorianne Villani or Carol Brum.

We may not be breezing through these days, but with each other's support, compassion, and focus on our Jewish values, we will certainly get to the other side of this pandemic a stronger congregation and community.

If you haven't already 'attended' our online services and programs, please check them out.

My biggest request is that you stay safe and stay in touch. We need each other now more than ever.

For instance, we are grateful that we have been able to use technology to take our Ohef Sholom community into the virtual world. We are grateful that Rabbi Roz and Cantor Jen have been able to live stream Shabbat services. And we were thrilled that 163 families joined us for our *Second Seder* in cyberworld. We are brainstorming new programs so that we can continue to connect while physically apart.




