



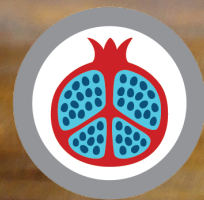

# PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

## Tablecloths, Honey, and Zoom: High Holidays 2020

Probably my preparation was similar to most of yours. . . ## ECOJUDAISM

### Ohef Sholom Temple Memorial Stones Installation



**V**isiting the grave of a loved one and leaving a stone has long been a Jewish tradition.

Because of the pandemic we find ourselves looking for adaptive ways to continue traditions. Jackie Haywood and Christina Verderosa of the EcoJudaism Committee came up with a meaningful way to honor the memory of loved ones at OST during this time of isolation – a memorial installation of hand-painted stones.

You and your family are invited to design a stone or several stones with the name(s) of your loved one(s) to be placed in a memorial garden on the Temple grounds. Each stone should reflect the person being honored and the makers' ideas and skill level.

Smooth rocks can be decorated with paint, pencil, or other permanent colorant. If you use water-base paint, a coat of water-proof clear varnish or acrylic

(labeled AP nontoxic) needs to be applied. Rocks should be least 4 inches in one direction and no bigger than a pint of ice cream. (Please avoid those sticky cut outs and sequins as they will probably fall off creating a litter problem).

Each stone should have the name(s) of who you are honoring. Their dates of birth and death can be included, as well as any other images or information that you would like to include. Write your contact information on the bottom in pencil.

Stones may be designed so that the design is only on one side, or it can stand upright and be designed on multiple sides. Upright stones must be able to balance or to go into the soil.

Stones should be brought to OST **no later than September 17**. Stay tuned for information about unveiling the memorial rock garden, which will be on display for all to visit through October. We hope that congregants will come by to see this memorial installation and spend some time thinking about the memories of people who are no longer living, but were important in our lives.

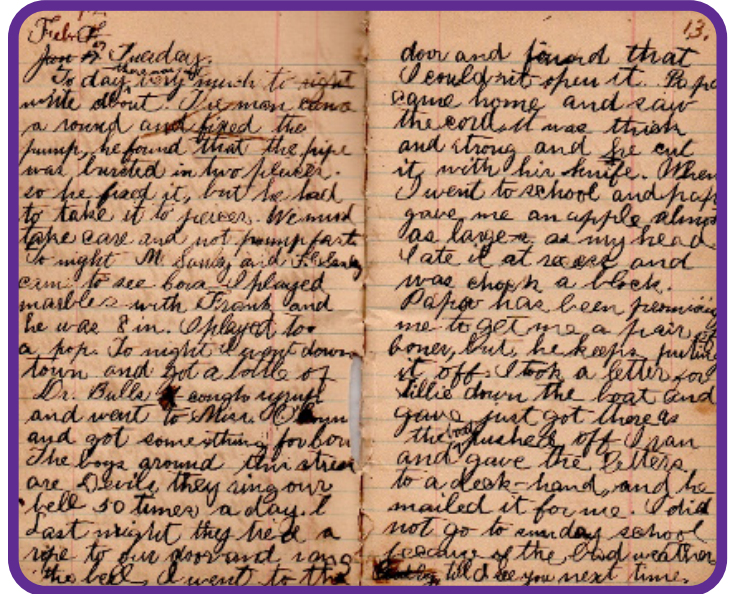
## IN THE ARCHIVES WITH ALICE

### An Archives Treasure: The Diary of Benjamin Franklin Metzger

**A**mong the most valuable holdings in the Mollie and George Radin Archives is the 19th century diary of a young boy living in Portsmouth, Virginia. Benjamin Franklin Metzger was just three months shy of his twelfth birthday when he began keeping the diary. The writing style is fluid and sometimes lyrical. However, it is the diary's importance as a historical document that makes it so valuable. There are details about school and Sunday School, about daily life at home – including meals, chores, shopping, and running errands for the family. There are stories about his father, brother Nathan, and three sisters (his mother having died a few years earlier), and there are frequent references to friends, neighbors, teachers, shopkeepers, and Rabbi Bernhard Ebersohn, who held the pulpit at Ohel Sholom from 1877 to 1899.

The first diary entry, written on January 1, 1885, set the tone, with details about his daily activity, his feelings about his life, and his intentions for the future. "Have been sick," he wrote, "[there] has been [a] holiday in school. But to day [sic] has been the most lonesome. I have not done any-thing [sic] but playing. I have turned over a new leaf, to mind when spoken to, and not to say any words out of the way, and try to be a good boy."

There are poignant references to family milestones like the death of his "Uncle [Joel] Metzger." "Verry sorry," Benjamin noted next to his uncle's name. There are also notations concerning happier events like birthdays, his bar mitzvah, or the weddings of two of his cousins, Nathan and Carrie. A parade to celebrate George Washington's birthday led the boy, whose middle name honored the memory of another



founding father, to write: "Washington freed America and I think he ought to be remembered." And like many other diarists, he ended with an endearment. "I am going to leave you now," he

wrote, "as I want to study my lessons. By Golly how funny I feel. Goodby, goodby dear one."

When Portsmouth's 75-year-old harbor master died, Benjamin expressed his sorrow and penned an epitaph for the captain: "Capt. Peters died Tuesday night at 10 o'clock . . . Gone never to come again. May he sleep in peace. Mr. Peters was a good soul and gallant soldier. May God forgive his sins if he has any to forgive." And when a few months later, Benjamin contemplated the family's forthcoming move to Norfolk, he wrote a poem entitled "The Move," expressing both his

### The Move

I am going to leave my friends forever,  
Oh! What a pang darts through me,  
But as long as I am living there  
They will never be forgotten by me.

It is hard to go away from those I love,  
But why should I be talking like this?  
If they love me as well as I love them  
I am sure I would never be missed.

Oh, I hate to leave my native city  
The house where I was nursed  
And across the creek to the livin' city  
Won't make it very much worse.

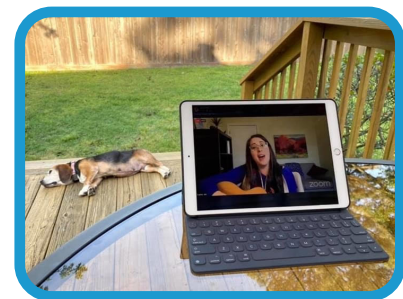
More than ever, given the current climate of our nation, these gifts are making a positive impact as they help to fulfill Ohef Sholom's mission and insure a united and strong Jewish community for future generations.

With the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, Ohef Sholom has worked hard to keep our Temple community engaged in new and meaningful ways. To that end we've:

- Been conducting Shabbat services online, which affords many the opportunity who typically were unable to drive in for services to participate.
- Sent 97 Shabbat Boxes to Temple families with Religious School age children. A live Zoom unboxing event was enjoyed by young and old alike!



- Rabbi Roz's year-long Anti-Racism course has engaged over 100 households for each class.
- Cantor Jen's story time reached over 125 families and garnered another 5,000+ views on our Facebook.
- OST's new pandemic-inspired *Love Thy Neighbor* group hand-delivered 150 cookie packages with personalized thank you notes to the staff at Beth Sholom Village. They also hosted a free COVID-19 Testing Event at Iglesia de Dios Adonai (our Immigration Task Force partner) and distributed 200 boxed lunches, fresh produce, iced drinks, masks and hand sanitizer.
- Since the pandemic started, OST's Soup Kitchen remained true to its mission by setting up shop in the Temple parking lot, where they provided 250+ hot grab-n-go meals to our Ghent neighbors in need.

▶ sadness at leaving his friends and his determination to never forget them.

The last few entries are filled with stories of wintertime chores and excursions, but the diary ends abruptly on January 15, 1887, with the now almost thirteen-year-old boy explaining that it was the Sabbath, and he had to stop writing. Perhaps he continued the diary elsewhere at another

time. Or perhaps he had lost interest in keeping a daily journal. We'll never know the answer, but we are richer for having his record of the preceding two years. In addition to its value as a primary source for our knowledge of the social history of this region, the diary gives us rare insight into the life of the Jewish community of Tidewater Virginia in the 1880s.
