calendar, the month of Cheshvan, which this year spans from October 30 through November 28, is known as Mar Cheshvan, or "bitter Cheshvan." It is so named because, unlike the month of Tishrei that precedes it, it contains no

n the Jewish

Jewish holidays. However, we do have a secular holiday that falls on the final day of *Cheshvan* -that of Thanksgiving. While it is not a holiday in the Jewish calendar, I would argue that Thanksgiving is just as Jewish as Rosh HaShanah or Simchat Torah.

Leah, our prophet from Torah, knew that the 12 tribes of Israel would descend from the children of Jacob, her husband. Jacob had four wives, and so it was assumed that each of them would give birth to three male children, from whom those tribes would descend. Leah indeed had three sons, and then, surprisingly, she found herself pregnant once again. When her fourth son was born, Leah recognized that she had been blessed with more than her share. She said, "This time, I will give thanks to God." She named her son Yehudah, from the Hebrew root .n, T, , which means "thanks." From this, we derive the name Judah, and from Judah, we get Judaism. Judaism literally means, "give thanks." The very definition of Judaism is gratitude.

Gratitude isn't just our namesake -- it is our practice. The first words that traditional Jews utter each morning are, "Modah ani l'fanecha," or, "I am grateful before You." This prayer expresses gratitude for the simple act of waking up in the morning, setting the tone for the day to come. We thank God with a blessing for so many everyday miracles. There are blessings for seeing a rainbow, for the food and drink we enjoy, for reaching momentous occasions, for seeing beauty in nature, for hearing good news, for experiencing natural wonders -- the list goes on and on. Gratitude in Judaism is a constant daily

effort that teaches us to take notice of all that is good in our lives and to express our thanks freely, to God and to each other.

On Thanksgiving, our families gather around an abundant table of food and stop to take an accounting of all that is good and beautiful in our lives. What could be more Jewish than family, food, and gratitude? It is a yearly exercise in the *middah* (soul trait, from the Jewish practice of *Mussar*) of *hakarat hatov*, recognizing the good.

Join us as we recognize the blessing of our neighbors and our community with our annual joint Thanksgiving service in partnership with Freemason Baptist Church. This year, we will be celebrating on Wednesday, November 27th at Ohef Sholom with a reception at 6:00 pm and a service at 7:00 pm.

In the spirit of Thanksgiving, I am grateful to each of you for being a part of my sacred community. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart, for your commitment to Ohef Sholom and for all you bring to our abundant table. May you and your family have a joyful and meaningful Thanksgiving celebration. \$

TREX BENCH RECYCLING UPDATE

We Have Our Trex Bench!

e have our bench! Come up to the art room on the second floor, look at our Trex bench, sit on it and take pride in what



we have accomplished. By turning in over 900 pounds of plastic film in six months, we have kept this material out of landfills and the oceans, saving the lives of sea turtles and other animals who ingest these toxic materials.

But our work is not finished. We have actually already received our second bench, so now it is up to us to come up with the 500 pounds to earn it. Keep the plastic coming; grocery bags, dry cleaning bags, produce bags, case wrap, bubble wrap, food storage bags and any type of plastic film are acceptable. Please do not include plastic bottles, cups, plates or paper napkins. All material must be clean and dry. Shake off those food scraps or dirt before you turn your bags in.

By giving your plastic to the Trex project, you keep hundreds of pounds of plastic out of the environment and out of the stomachs of marine animals who mistake pieces of plastic for tasty jellyfish.

Special thanks to Gwen Darrow, who took care of having the benches put together for her *bat mitzvah* project, Kitty Wolf and everyone who continues to bring in their plastic and help clean up our oceans. ☆

Mazel Tov to Our Newest Learners!



IN THE ARCHIVES WITH ALICE

Program Features the Rescue of the SS Quanza Passengers

n October 6 Carpool Café at OST brought together more than 140 people for the first local screening of a new documentary that tells the story of the passengers of the SS Quanza. The SS Quanza was a Portuguese steamship carrying Holocaust refugees who had been turned away by Mexico and the U.S. and were being sent back to Nazi-occupied Europe. The ship docked in Norfolk on September 11, 1940, to load coal for its trip back to Portugal. News of the plight of the passengers set off a flurry of activity in Tidewater and around the country that led to their rescue. However, the success of the Quanza episode sparked new resentment in the State Department, which had been adamantly opposed to giving the passengers refugee status, and that resentment contributed to further restriction of Jewish immigration in the remaining years of World War II.

The documentary, *Nobody Wants Us*, was produced and directed by Newport News native Laura Seltzer-Duny. It tells the story with historical film footage, photographs, and drawings, voice-over by actors, and narration by two of the former passengers, who were among the children on the ship. Commentary by those who have studied the issues surrounding the story provides important historical context. Former congregant and OST historian, Elise Margolius, is featured in the film and is a fitting representative of the members of the Council of Jewish Women who brought food and moral support to the passengers while they were detained onboard the ship and provided shelter for them when they were allowed to disembark.

The October 6 program also featured a brunch provided by OST's Men's Club, and a panel discussion led by the filmmaker. Historical context was provided by Dr. Eric Mazur, Gloria and David Furman Professor of Judaic Studies and Fellow of the Center for the Study of Religious Freedom at Virginia Wesleyan University, and Elena Baum, Director of the Holocaust Commission of the United Jewish Federation of Tidewater.

Duke Rosenberg, one of few remaining eyewitnesses, shared his memories of accompanying his mother, Rita Rosenberg, the night the passengers

were released. Ed Lazaron recounted stories of his grandfather, Herbert Gerst, whose organization for new immigrants provided advocacy and support for the passengers. Karen Plotnick, granddaughter of Elise Margolius, brought two Portuguese dolls that we have reason to believe were given to her grandmother by one of the passengers. Bill Nusbaum and Ted and Chuck Kaufman, were there to represent Justine Nusbaum and Doris Kaufman, two of the other members of the Council of Jewish Women who played an important role in making the passengers feel that there were people here who cared. Cantor Jennifer Reuben drew parallels with the current refugee crisis.

The program was jointly sponsored by OST's Men's Club and OST's Mollie and George Radin Archives.*

Celebrating OST



TESHUVAH STORIES (2 OF 3)

JOURNEYS TO JUDAISM: Marissa Collins

where I was meant to be.

My hunch was doubly confirmed when I toured the religious school for the first time. I had been so impressed to hear that the school already had a Special Education teacher on staff. When I asked about which room the Special Education students would be in, I was met with a thoroughly confused expression. "What do you mean? All students are grouped by their grade, and that's it." It sounds like such a simple statement, but for families like mine, being included and valued is never something that can be taken for granted. In a world that either tries to avert its eyes from people who are different or that, arguably worse, acts as though it does us a favor by allowing us to exist in communal spaces, finding a community that embraces and sees value in all people is truly something special.

he first time that I told my mother that I would grow up to be Jewish, I was 12 years old. In November 2017, I came by myself to OST for the first time. I was so nervous. I did not know any Hebrew, and I come from a long line of devout Catholics. Soon it became clear that I was right

Being a convert is an exquisite but sometimes excruciating experience. Even my accepting and loving family and friends sometimes struggle to



understand. "But what about Christmas?" they have asked, or, "Your kids already are so different, why do you have to make it harder for them?" "Do actual Jews consider you Jewish?"

At one point during my Beit Din, Cantor Jen remarked that, "We were all together at Sinai," which struck me as a particularly beautiful thought. In converting, I wasn't leaving myself or my family and history behind. Rather, I was finally the person I had always truly been with the people who had always been meant to be mine

I have just returned home from my first trip to Eretz Yisrael. For the first time in my life, I was immersed in Jewishness. I felt the most 'myself' that I have in a while. I came to see that there has never been only one way to be Jewish. That indeed, if the literal meaning of the word "Yisrael" is "wrestles with God," then perhaps my struggles with faith and questioning are quintessentially Jewish.

As Edmund Fleg so powerfully put it, "I am a Jew because Judaism demands no abdication of my mind. I am a Jew because wherever there are tears and suffering, the Jew weeps. I am a Jew because wherever the cry of despair is heard, the Jew hopes. I am a Jew because the message of Judaism is a universal promise." Here at OST, I see the universal promise of Judaism. Thank you for making space for me, and I hope we grow and learn together for many years to come. \$\$
