Be the Light

The Hebrew word *Menorah* means "lamp of God." We light one additional candle each day during Chanukah, not only to commemorate the little pitcher of oil which miraculously lasted eight days, but also to bring light to the darkest, coldest days of

the year. Other cultures had the same idea. In the first century, the Pagan Roman Emperor Aurelian selected December 25th as the day to celebrate the Winter Solstice (the shortest day of the year). In 275, Christians adapted it as the day on which to proclaim the birth of Jesus, their light unto the world. It shouldn't surprise you that Jews also selected this time period to observe our Festival of Lights, Chanukah.

Of course, Chanukah doesn't always fall on December 25th because the Jewish lunar calendar doesn't match up exactly to the Gregorian one. But this year, both holidays fall on December 25th, which makes it a perfect time to reflect on how challenging it can be to keep Jewish festivals in our largely secular, majority-Christian world. What makes it even more of a dilemma is that many people, Jews included, celebrate Christmas as a secular holiday -- the way it was originally intended by the Pagans -- as an homage to spring with the hope that the cold and snow will be soon behind. This is particularly true of Southern Jews, many of whom are of Germany ancestry, where it was and is very common to mark the winter months in this way.

Additionally, since many of us are a part of interfaith families, we may find ourselves celebrating Christmas with relatives or in our own homes. This can cause some confusion, particularly for children, who struggle with questions of identity anyway. They also can get bad cases of FOMO (Fear of Missing Out) of the fun (and presents) when so many other children are enjoying Christmas festivities. To counter this, many parents have ramped up their family observance of Chanukah to include 8 nights of gift giving, which is truly not the meaning or purpose of our holiday.

Indeed, Chanukah means re-dedication and is about committing ourselves even more fully to our Judaism and Jewish way of life. This includes being lamps of God and doing activities that bring light into the world. In previous December bulletin columns, I have written about different kinds of hands-on mitzvah projects you can do with your families to make Chanukah meaningful in its own right (a quick Google search will yield many results). But the best way to make the holiday festive is to make it fun; invite family and friends over for latkes, chocolate gelt, games of dreidel, and lighting the Chanukiah. We have a wonderful Chanukah service and dinner at OST, this year on December 20th (sign up online at ohefsholom.org or mail in the form found in this Bulletin) and we will once again be doing Facebook Live candle lightings from different locations each night of Chanukah at 6:30 pm.

Whether your winter tradition includes a tree, a menorah, or both, be sure to celebrate the uniqueness of Chanukah and, by all means, be the light in the world you wish to see! ☆

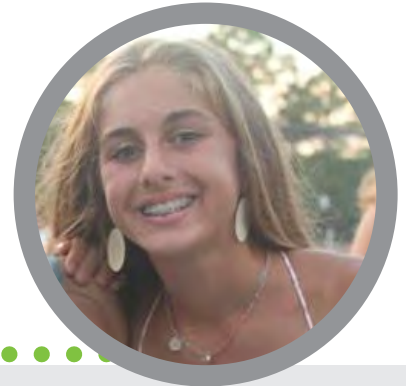

MILITARY OUTREACH:

Veterans to Receive Access to Commissary/PX

According to the Department of Defense, starting Jan. 1, 2020, all service-connected Veterans, Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners of war (POW), and individuals approved and designated as the primary family caregivers of eligible Veterans under the Department of Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) can use commissaries, exchanges, and morale, welfare and recreation (MWR) retail facilities, in-person and online.

We love donations of food and clothing. Needed items are winter gloves, lip balm, hair combs, undershirts, fruit, snack items, bread, milk, OJ. Monetary donations are always appreciated and can be sent to Temple with the designation of OST Caring Committee/NEST.

Ohef Sholom is once again hosting NEST (Norfolk Emergency Shelter Team). The NEST program is a network of over 30 churches and synagogues that house the homeless for one week each during the chilly winter months. Our guests arrive in the evening and mats are provided for them to sleep on. We provide 3 meals a day – a hot dinner, a hot breakfast, and a brown bag lunch. Families are encouraged to volunteer! We welcome children over the age of 5; anyone under the age of 14 needs to be accompanied by an adult. Seasoned volunteers and Norfolk Police officers are present at all times.

Who is eligible Jan. 1, 2020?

- **Veterans:**
 - Purple Heart recipients
 - Former prisoners of war
 - Veterans with 0-90% service-connected disability ratings

(For former service members who have not yet sought disability compensation from VA, visit <https://www.va.gov/disability/eligibility>)

- **Medal of Honor recipients and Veterans with 100% service-connected disability ratings** are already eligible under existing DOD policy.
- **Caregivers:**
 - On Jan. 1, individuals approved and designated as the primary family caregiver of an eligible veteran under the PCAFC will be eligible for these privileges.
 - For information about primary family caregivers in the PCAFC, visit <https://www.caregiver.va.gov>

Required credentials.

- **Veterans:**
 - On Jan. 1, Veterans eligible solely under this act who are eligible to obtain a Veteran Health Identification Card must use this credential for in-person installation and privilege access. The card must display the Veteran's eligibility status (i.e., PURPLE HEART, FORMER POW or SERVICE CONNECTED). Apply here: <https://www.va.gov/healthbenefits/vhic/index.asp>.
 - Veterans eligible solely under this act who are not enrolled in or are not eligible to enroll in VA health care, or who are enrolled in VA health care, but do not possess a Veteran

Health Identification Card will not have access to DoD and Coast Guard installations for in-person commissary, exchange, and MWR retail privileges, but will have full access to online exchanges and American Forces Travel.

-Medal of Honor recipients and Veterans with 100% service-connected disability ratings are eligible for DoD credentials under DoD policy.

- **Caregivers:**
 - Eligible caregivers will receive an eligibility letter from VA's Office of Community Care.
 - If you are a primary family caregiver under the PCAFC and lose your eligibility letter, please call 1-877-733-7927 to request a replacement. Please allow two weeks for processing. ✪

money directly to a qualifying charity.

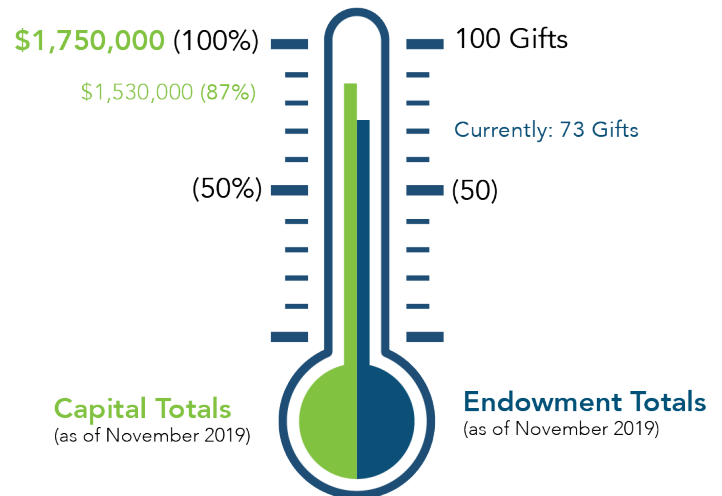

How ironic is it that we save for retirement through an IRA then at 70 ½ we're required to take a Required Minimum Distribution, RMD. This mandatory distribution is then taxed and the amount you receive is added to your yearly income. After discussing our options with our tax accountant, it became obvious the best way to resolve this dilemma of our current annual charity giving and the RMD was to combine them into a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). This will allow us to increase our current charitable commitment through the PILLAR program and reduce the impact on our annual taxes.

IN THE ARCHIVES WITH ALICE

A Look Back at Our History, Part VII: Ohef Sholom's Seventh Twenty-Five Years (1994 - 2019)

Continued from the October issue
of the *Temple pOST Bulletin*.

It has been said that “those who look only to the past or present are certain to miss the future.” The past 25 years have demonstrated that this congregation has taken that caveat to heart. Changes in our clergy, our synagogue, and our congregation have been met with an indomitable will to see change as challenge rather than obstacle.

In 1994 and 1995, congregants celebrated the past with a 100-Year Retrospective Service, the present with a special birthday party oneg, and the future with the commissioning of a new choral work by world-renowned composer Richard Danielpour. Rabbi Lawrence Forman was approaching his 25th year as senior rabbi. Sisterhood sponsored a No Frills Ball, and Men’s Club sponsored its first annual golf tournament. There was a Purim Food Drive, and there were interfaith activities to benefit the homeless. In the years that followed there were many firsts, among them the first congregational Seder, the first Purimspiel, and the arrival of the congregation’s first full-time cantor, Jennifer Bern-Vogel.

The new millennium was celebrated with the installation of Rabbi Michael Joseph as the congregation’s new senior rabbi. A Tekiah Campaign was inaugurated to provide for modernization of the building and meeting the congregation’s long-term needs. However, disaster struck in August of 2004, when the ceiling in the Archives loft and then a large section of the sanctuary roof collapsed. Thankfully, no one was hurt; however, the congregation held meetings and services in neighboring Ghent United Methodist Church until repairs were complete, just in time for the installation of Rabbi Rosalin Mandelberg as the congregation’s new senior rabbi. Congregants celebrated with a weekend of religious services, a gala, and an open house with tours of the new facility.

traditions like the interfaith Thanksgiving service with Freemason Street Baptist Church and recognition of the considerable contributions of members through awards like the Henry B. Kaufmann and Kurt Rosenberg Awards were still very much a part of Temple life.

In the second decade of the second millennium, congregants bade a sad farewell to Cantor Jennifer Bern-Vogel but were heartened by the arrival of Cantor Wally Schachet-Briskin. Two years later, in 2012, Ohef Sholom welcomed the members of Temple Sinai of Portsmouth and their beloved rabbi, Rabbi Arthur Z. Steinberg (of blessed memory) in a merger in which the two congregations became one. The installation of Temple Sinai’s inspirational stained-glass window panels the following year in what is now known as the Sinai Chapel is a tangible reminder of the way in which that merger continues to enrich the life of this temple community.

In the following years, the congregation renewed its commitment to community service by adding its very own monthly Soup Kitchen to its traditional outreach efforts. Congregants welcomed the arrival of Cantor Jennifer Rueben, who along with our own Rabbi Roz, continues to invigorate and inspire this congregation. The congregation adopted the Reform prayer book *Mishkan T’filah*, and more recently, new prayer books for the High Holy Days. Innovations like occasional Friday Night Live services and involvement in an Immigration Task Force stand as testament to OST’s enthusiasm in meeting the challenges of the 21st century. This year, the congregation celebrates 175 years of history. It is a history enlivened by the passion of generations of members, the service of dedicated congregational leaders, the inspirational guidance of gifted clergy, and by dedication to the words engraved above the portico, “My House Shall be a House of Prayer for all Peoples.” ✨

JOURNEYS TO JUDAISM: Giselle Weinstein

I was born in Santiago de Cuba in 1957 into a Catholic family. In 1959 Fidel Castro's Communist revolution and dictatorship confiscated personal property, seized private bank accounts, changed Cuba's currency, closed churches, and blared communist propaganda. We were not allowed to speak publicly about God or any ideas that challenged the Communist Regime.

In 1961 my sister and three brothers escaped to the U.S., and were alienated from us and each other, at the ages of 14, 13, 9 and 6. My parents, meanwhile, had to stay behind without any guarantee that they would ever see their children again. My little sister and I, ages 2 and 3 respectively, stayed with them.

My faith journey began then. Our family had been torn apart, and God became the grounding and the cornerstone of my life. I recited the daily prayers, and I completed sacraments intended for older children, in case we were killed during the political turmoil. In May 1964 we finally escaped, and my mom, my sister, and I travelled through Spain, where we lived for several months. In Madrid, we took shelter with an order of nuns, and they taught us the Old Testament. They described Moses' confrontation with Pharaoh, the Ten Plagues, Passover, Exodus of Israel, wandering through the desert, and Covenant with God:

You are a people set apart, a Light to the Nations. You shall be My People, And I Shall be Your God!

I was enthralled. I was wandering in the desert, desperate for the Promised Land. I discovered

then that I was Jewish first and foremost.

Reunited in the U.S., we couldn't escape violence in our world. We witnessed the daily effects of the Vietnam War, the Civil Rights Movement, Kent State University protests and fatalities, Mohammed Ali and other conscientious objectors, Nelson Mandela and the struggle to end Apartheid. My father labelled protesters and activists as "Communists" and vilified people with liberal views that demanded their government provide equality for all. Even as we struggled to reunify with peace and love in our family, we couldn't escape the scars of Cuba, and I learned not to disagree with my parents.

The Talmud reminds us:

Do not be daunted by the enormity of the world's grief. You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it.

The truth of nonviolence is dangerous to the hypocrisy of our society, and we see the evidence of that in the vilification and assassination of nonviolent activists throughout history. But now I want to live my life centered by nonviolence and the Covenant that we are all God's children.

So here is my truth. I believe that all institutions exist to serve others and not to retain power in the hands of the few. I believe in the basic rights of people to have dignity, body autonomy, healthcare, and safety. I believe in PEACE in all its forms, including laying down of nuclear weapons, halting foreign arms trade, restricting personal access to firearms, sheltering refugees, reforming prisons, and depolluting our earth.

I believe that my beliefs must be followed up with actions. Matthew and I succeeded in a project dubbed De-ICE Norfolk City Jail. We met with Sheriff Baron to end the contract with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency to stop holding alleged undocumented citizens without due process.

▶ We work with The Hampton Roads Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons to engage with nuclear abolitionists, such as retired U.S. Air Force Four Star General Lee Butler and Minuteman launch officer Bruce Blair and even Soviet Union's Lieutenant Colonel Stanislav Petrov who speak of the accumulation of growing nuclear risks that cannot be contained indefinitely. And we are working to pass a Cities Appeal Resolution calling on the federal government to sign the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

You delight in our works of justice and righteousness, Oh Lord. And when we give of ourselves in full measure, YOU abide in us. ☆
