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CLERGY CORNER

have to admit that I've always had a hard time with the holiday of Purim. The story, while fun when we water it down into a shpiel, is full of a lot of things that challenge me to my core. King Achashveirosh is a dimwitted bully. Vashti could be a poster-woman of the #metoo movement. Mordechai is an opportunistic sneak. Esther lies her way into a marriage for riches and power. Haman is a genocidal maniac. Don't even get me started on what the Jews do after the shpiel-y part ends! As I re-read the Megillah each year, I often find myself wondering what this is doing amongst our sacred texts.

I recently read about a study of humor and its effects on perseverance. In this study, participants were shown short videos and then asked to perform a task which, unbeknownst to them, could not be completed. Those who watched videos that were funny spent twice as long working toward the task as those who watched videos that were motivational or informative. The study concluded that experiencing humor has a profound impact on a person's ability and willingness to persevere.

Why might this be? I can only answer anecdotally. There is nothing I love more than a good laugh. It diffuses my stress, breaks through my frustration, and brings me closer to those who share it with me. Watching latenight comics pointing out the farcical nature of politics and current events helps me to feel hopeful. My family group-text, in which we poke fun at each other and trade jokes, makes long days of heavy work go by a little faster. When I'm feeling burnt out, my first instinct is to find someone to laugh with. I can only conclude what this study did - that the joy and laughter that come from good humor make it easier to persist, to persevere, and to conquer challenges.

Perhaps in a modern context, the importance of the details of the Purim story take a backseat to its ability to help us to laugh at ourselves and laugh with each other. Once each year, the observance of Purim reminds us to stop taking ourselves and our lives so seriously. Our tradition demands that we blot out the name of super-villain Haman with noisemakers. We

celebrate until we can't tell the difference between mean old Haman and righteous Mordechai. We reinterpret the story in the form of a shpiel, designed to draw the humor out of this ancient scroll in a way that speaks to us where we are. The Purim trope (the melody by which one chants the Megillah) bounces up and down octaves, scoops from major to minor, and playfully mimics the sounds of other moments from our year. Purim takes one of the more disconcertingly serious stories in our tradition and prompts us to turn it inside out, reminding us that there is humor to be found in even the most distressing situations.

Perseverance is a hallmark of the Jewish story. Since the days of Moses, our tradition and our history are full of stories of how we have overcome perilous obstacles, conquered seemingly impossible challenges, and risen above our circumstances. I believe that our ability to laugh at ourselves is one of the reasons that the Jewish people have survived against such enormous odds. Perhaps this is why we celebrate Purim - to build into our calendar a time to laugh together, to lighten our communal load, and to refresh our souls so we can persist.

On Wednesday, February 28th, our community will spend an evening laughing together (see the cover for details!). The "world-famous" OST Dinner Theatre will present Purim Through the Decades: A Time Traveling Purimspiel. Please come in a costume from your favorite decade and be ready to laugh your way through 70 years of music and 2000 years of tradition. 

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

hope your 2018 is off to a great start. The snow, though magical in form, can cause such disruption in our lives! Last month, I mentioned that our trip to Boston in December for the URJ Biennial was a profound, perhaps even transformative, experience for all who attended. It was truly a "moment of unity and rededication for our Reform Movement." One of the major themes of this Biennial was a reaffirmation of our Movement's commitment to congregation-based social justice work. This theme was evident throughout, from the keynote and plenary speakers, to the plethora of sessions focused on this sacred work. This theme came full circle for me when our OST contingency of 10 joined with thousands of members of other Brit Olam congregations in waving the flags proudly donned on our lanyards, proclaiming our shared commitment to positively changing our world towards justice. It was empowering and emotional to see us stand in solidarity together.

To date, over 140 Congregations across our *Movement* have excitedly and intentionally brought the *Brit Olam*, an initiative launched 8 months ago by the Religious Action Center, to their communities to recommit to deep and meaningful engagement in social justice work. We officially became a *Brit Olam* congregation this past October.

Our first step was to decide "how" to best tackle our *intentional* commitment. It was clear that navigating the challenging issues we face in our communities and world would require some training. We felt we needed help to learn the tools that are necessary for the difficult conversations required, especially those dealing with issues which involve multiple perspectives and which evoke strong emotions.

The December 1st Shabbat Service and Civil Discourse workshop led by Jonathon Zur, Director of The Virginia Center for Inclusive Communities, provided those attending with just this. The focus of the workshop was to help people dialogue across lines of difference to truly listen, understand, and build empathy amongst each other. Put simply, how do we disagree without being disagreeable? Jonathan's words from the bimah and the practice exercises he led in the workshop that followed proved engaging and helpful and left us wanting more! This primer helped attendees begin to develop some valuable skills required to engage with people with other perspectives by "practicing" them.

We currently are working to plan similar workshops to continue to develop and hone skills for us to use when we tackle issues in real time. Rather than jumping right into some of the challenging issues our world faces, like gun control, immigration policy, or racial equality, we felt our best response as a congregational community was to prepare ourselves for having dialogue around these often heated issues and to set the foundation for meaningful and purposeful dialogue.

Practice makes perfect, or at least progress, and opportunities for practice are available to us all the time. A perfect example presented itself to me this past week while volunteering for NEST. As the result of our Special Needs and Security Committee's recent work to create a comprehensive Security Plan for our Temple and the subsequent affirmation of this Plan by the Norfolk Police

officers we regularly employ, the decision to check our NEST guests' bags upon check-in was made. The intention and purpose of this decision was to ensure the safety of all - our volunteers as well as our guests. As often happens when implementing anything new, there were unexpected challenges. The weather for one, with snow and well below freezing temperatures, and the time involved in checking 60+ quests' bags and belongings created angst and discomfort for many, most especially our dedicated and empathetic volunteers. With everyone's patience and understanding, strained as it may have been, we managed to make the best of the situation. Many NEST guests expressed their gratitude to us for ensuring their safety. The following day we were able to engage in "civil discourse" with those having varying perspectives to come up with a plan we could all be comfortable with, at least in the short term. We were able to listen to each other, find value in each other's perspective, and reach an amicable solution for the problem. Though there is ongoing dialogue needed to reach a longer-term solution, progress was made. Each person remained open to listening to the others' perspective and a just solution achieved, along with the overarching goal of safety for all.

Harmony doesn't come from infinite tolerance of everyone's "personal truth." It comes from surrendering to Higher Truth.

In his inaugural address, Governor Ralph Northam stated the process so succinctly, "The path to progress is marked by honest give-and-take among people who truly want to make life better for those around them. I will remember treating the symptoms of problems may be easy in the short-run, but getting to the root of the problem and solving it from the bottom up is always more effective in the long-run."

As we prepare to engage in more impactful and meaningful social justice work that our *Brit Olam* commits us to and our *Jewish Values* obligate us to, I hope we all *find opportunities to practice the principles of civil discourse in all our affairs in the days, weeks, months, and years ahead. We must recognize that we all have different perspectives based on our different experiences, values, and beliefs about the world, and that they all have value. With a commitment to keeping an open mind and listening to others, their experiences, thoughts and perspectives, "getting to yes" is made possible.*

As Oprah Winfrey recently stated in her Golden Globe Awards speech, "What I know for sure is that speaking your truth is the most powerful tool we all have." Often, however, our truth is not the only one. In seeing the value in others' truth and perspectives, we are seeing the sacred in them and finding our way to a higher truth that our world desperately needs.

FAMILY LEARNING

Learning Through Play

"We are Jewish everyday," says Kitty Wolf, long-time early childhood education professional, and founder of Wiggles & Giggles in its sixth year at Ohef Sholom. "When we engage directly in Jewish activities, we are building our Jewish identity, and when we engage in 'secular' activities, our Jewish identity, as part of our larger identity, influences what we do and how we do it, often without any idea that it is doing so."

Two teens, Alisa Kosovsky and Madi Williamson, join Kitty and our group of Wiggling Gigglers each month on Sunday mornings, 11-12 to facilitate Jewish learning. "It brings me joy to lead young children in Jewish songs and to see them so engaged, " writes Alisa. "I get to see how the parents are with their kids so that I can learn how to take care of babies and toddlers," writes Madi. Grandparents often join our teens and young parents for an enriching multi-generation playtime. Playtime is open to the community, OST members and independent households.

Early childhood, from birth through age 3, is increasingly recognized by educational professionals and government funders as a critical imprinting period in the social and emotional development of adults. This recognition is based on viewing infants and toddlers as active, thinking learners. Their learning laboratories are social relationships with caregivers, peers, and teachers. We help infants and toddlers actively process basic social and emotional lessons like how to share, explore, resolve conflict and identify and express feelings constructively.

The vehicle for infant and toddler learning comes straight from the Torah. It is called Learning-by-doing, or in Hebrew, *Na-Aseh V'Nishmah*. (See Ex. 24:7) It is why Judaism is a religion of deeds rather than creeds. Learning-by-doing works for infants and toddlers because they are in a preverbal, sensorimotor stage of cognitive development. They play.

Our monthly convention of Wigglers and Gigglers make family trees with gloves, tiny sukkahs with berry boxes, and gratitude leaves on a tree of life. They also sing songs that include Hebrew words and dancing movements, such as "We are Thankful," "Did you ever Shake a Lulav," and for Passover, "Frogs were Jumping Everywhere."

Infants and toddlers learn through play. When the play of infants and toddlers is a celebration of Jewish holidays and mitzvot during this sensorimotor imprinting stage of development, their long-term Jewish identities acquire a social and emotional foundation in Jewish rituals.

The adult caregivers actively learn at Wiggles & Giggles too, by sharing practical ideas about how to "Do Judaism" at home, getting to know other caregivers in our Jewish community, and developing familiarity and comfort with our

Temple facilities and people.

Learning through play can be just as satisfying for adult learners who do not have the daily good fortune of playing with infants and toddlers in our homes. I've noticed an increase in board games at coffee shops, video games at home, and a national obsession with sports. Could these be our collective social and emotional outlets and team-building vehicles for community?

Our Jewish tradition values play because it is essentially learning by doing. So, no matter our age, there should always be room for some wiggles and giggles. Our Torah commands it.

How long have you been a member of Ohef Sholom and why did you decide to join?

How has Ohef Sholom impacted your life?

OST has had, and continues to have, a strong impact on our lives. We have met many lovely people here, and count a number as our dear friends now. That is such a blessing for us. We have a deep affection for Rabbi Roz and Cantor Jen. Rabbi Steinberg was our Rabbi for virtually the whole time he served Temple Sinai, and we suppose that he will always be Our Rabbi in our hearts. But now Rabbi Roz is our Rabbi, and she too is such a blessing for us.

What are you hopes for the future of Ohef Sholom?

Our hope for OST is that it continues to function as the heart and mind and spirit of Reform Judaism in the Hampton Roads area for many generations to come. Sarah and I want to do our part to help that tree set deep roots and blossom with sweet fruit.

LASTLY, all of the above considered, what did you decide to make a LIFE & LEGACY gift?

Our candle may flicker but for a moment in eternity, and we can never know the full impact of our actions on future generations, but we have faith that through LIFE & LEGACY we have added our light to the future of OST. Thank you, Matthew and Karen Fine.



OST: A CLOSER LOOK

Gearing Up For Ohef Sholom's Milestone Celebrations

The first record of Jewish worship in Norfolk took place in 1844 in what was called at the time, "The Fine White Pretentious Dwelling" on Cumberland Street. Twenty-three years later, following several moves and philosophical evolutions, the small congregation's name became Ohef Sholom – Lovers of Peace. Then in 1918, after still more moves, the growing congregation put down roots on Stockley Gardens – building the imposing structure where Ohef Sholom Temple has expanded and thrived, ever mindful of the words etched above the sanctuary doors, My House Shall Be Called A House of Prayer for All Peoples.

Now, 100 years later, on Sunday, October 14, we will commemorate the centennial anniversary of our beloved sanctuary as we also kick off months of celebrating Ohef Sholom Temple's 175th.

Rabbi Rick Jacobs, the esteemed president of Union for Reform Judaism, is slated to be our guest speaker for the rededication of the sanctuary. The afternoon's festivities and ceremony will include all ages and a reception for the entire congregation and our guests. June Saks and Sharon Nusbaum, co-chairs of the event, will share more details in the coming months.

Following the sanctuary event, we will continue to celebrate the achievement of reaching this 175th milestone by featuring all aspects of our very multi-faceted congregation. We are meeting with committee chairs and scheduling a variety of activities. But, that's not all!!! This moment is the perfect time to record and preserve our history. . . in the form of a publication to update the two histories written by Elise Margolius in 1969 and 1994 – publications which marked Ohef Sholom's 125th and 150th anniversaries.

Our celebration culminates with a gala in May 2019, marking Ohef Sholom's 175th year. Susan and Alex Pincus are chairing this event. Based on this duo's past successes, we know they will produce a party worthy of the occasion.

Opportunities for every single congregant to participate are planned . . . starting with the sanctuary event.

While many of the fundamentals of running a congregation remain the same as they were in the 1800s, one of the starkest differences can be found in the numbers. For example, in 1868, a Torah reader was engaged for the Sabbath at \$2.50, minimum dues for married men were \$10, and by 1870, minimum dues were raised to a whopping \$34. My, how times have changed!

In addition to the celebrations, we plan to raise funds to help insure our congregation's future, a future we wouldn't have without the committed congregants, clergy, and staff of today, who are fortunate to have as a foundation, the strength and wisdom of those who first met on Cumberland Street, those who found their way to build the magnificent home we now occupy, as well as all of Ohef Sholom's members and leaders throughout the years.
