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CLERGY CORNER

The Arc of the Moral Universe Is Long, but It Bends Towards Justice

S peaking against slavery at the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Convention in January of 1858, Theodore Parker said, "I do not pretend to understand the moral universe; the arc is a long one, my eye reaches but little ways; I cannot calculate the curve and complete the figure by the experience of sight, I can divine it by conscience. And from what I see I am sure it bends towards justice."

His words were borrowed by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and were a rallying call once again in the battle for civil rights in the 1960s.

100 to 150 years later, we need to remind ourselves of it once again. For as Jews, and as human beings, our tradition commands us to work to correct inequities wherever they arise, to pursue justice and to love our neighbors, and to treat them as we would want to be treated. This summer's events in Charlottesville were not only about anti-Semitism, they were also a disgusting display of racism and bigotry and a reminder that our country has a long way to go in terms of achieving equality . . . especially for people of color. As painful as it is to challenge our comfortable lives and to look inward at our own biases, it is, nonetheless, an obligation to act upon the dictates of our consciences -- to champion that which we know to be morally right -- in our world today.

Since I would never ask you to do what I would not do myself, I have also been engaged in this work of soul searching, dialogue, and truth telling with a group of interfaith and interracial clergy and community leaders. For over two years, we have met and continue to meet monthly to discuss issues of race, religion, oppression, violence, fear, anger, justice and injustice. In this time, we have come to learn about one another's experiences and beliefs and, most importantly of all, formed relationships to help us weather whatever societal storms inevitably come our way.

It isn't always easy. I believe myself to be an open-hearted, compassionate, empathic person, yet I can't even say that I always get it or that I always feel that my reality is understood by all present. But the work is important - no, critical - because we see what happens in

our world when people do not value the lives of others. Ignorance and fear breed hatred and violence and nobody prevails.

Calling it **Building Bridges Week**, several events are planned. Please join us for any or all of the following:

- Sunday, January 7 from 5:00-7:00 pm at Congregation Beth El for City on the Hill Forum: An Interfaith Dialogue on Race and Politics. It features an exceptional panel of clergymen, all of whom are sure to be passionate and engaging in their challenges to us to do more to repair our world. The event is free, but requires that you RSVP to www.theurcnorfolk.com/events/forum.
- Friday, January 12 at 6:30 pm during Shabbat services at OST, Cantor Jen, Chuck Woodward and the choir will present a musical program entitled: Psalms and Songs of Hope!
- Monday, January 15 at 6:00 pm at the TCC Roper Center for the Performing Arts, there will be a screening of the movie, Marshall, based on the early career of Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, when, as a young lawyer, he defended a black chauffeur charged with the sexual assault and attempted murder of his white socialite employer. A discussion will follow the film. The event is free, but requires that you RSVP to www.jewishva.org/marshall.

Parker's words are as true today as ever -the arc of the moral universe is long -- but it bends toward justice only if we help it to do so. Please join us for any or all of these programs and fulfill the mitzvah of healing the world one act at a time.



A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Renewal of Faith and Hope

reetings 2018! As I sit down to write this, I am preparing to attend the URJ Biennial in Boston with 9 others from our congregation. Having attended one other, I know what a treat I am in for and am excited to witness those going for their first time. It is truly an energizing and awakening experience on so many levels. Upon returning, it will only be a matter of days before Chanukah begins. Chanukah, which means "dedication," is the festival that commemorates the purification and rededication of the Temple to the Jewish people after overcoming the oppression of the Syrian empire. The miracle of Chanukah most frequently referenced is that of the oil lasting for 8 nights, when seemingly only enough for one. The equally significant miracle was the deliverance of the Jewish people from oppression, along with the values and beliefs central to their faith. It was these values and beliefs that restored the Temple and restored them as a people.

The miracle of Chanukah, much like the ringing in of a New secular Year, can be a powerful reminder to us as Jews, and as fellow human beings, that in order for us to survive and thrive in this world we must remain dedicated, or *rededicate ourselves*, *to those values expressed in the Torah and our deep faith in God*, (whatever that means or looks like to you as an individual) to repair the world as we did our Temple.

From its beginnings, Tikkun Olam has served as a pillar of the Reform Movement. At the Biennial, those of us attending and representing Ohef Sholom were recognized as sacred partners in repairing the world and as a Brit Olam congregation. Our becoming a member of this Covenant with our World shows our deep commitment to this sacred work. Rather than mandating the ways in which our congregation should take action, the Brit Olam serves as a guidepost and a framework for us to move our social justice efforts closer to the forefront of our community. The Brit Olam can aid us in facilitating important but often challenging conversations about how our deeply-held Jewish values call on us to engage in the public arena. One of the core tenets of this covenant is to foster a culture of sacred and civil dialogue in our congregations, creating a space for diversity of opinions. It will help us to engage more deeply in social justice work through a Jewish lens and offer us support in many ways.

In December we hosted Jonathon Zur from the VCIC who spoke to us about the topic of civil discourse and then led 40 of us in a workshop. It was our first effort after signing on to be a *Brit Olam* congregation and our sincere commitment to expanding and deepening our engagement in social justice work. The workshop helped us to gain insight and to learn the skills to engage in dialogue with others with differing perspectives and views. It was

a truly meaningful and eye-opening experience for all who attended. We look forward to offering more like this in the future.

This month we have several opportunities for those wanting to engage in the sacred task of *tikkun olam* and social justice, *tzedakah*. January 3-10 is our annual hosting of the N.E.S.T. (Norfolk Emergency Shelter Team) program where we provide hot meals in a safe, warm and welcoming overnight space for a full week for close to 60 men and women challenged by homelessness. I have personally participated in this effort for at least the past 12+ years, most often doing the overnight shift. It is truly one of the most meaningful ways I can be of service to my fellow human beings. To sign up for N.E.S.T. volunteer shifts, follow the Quick Link on our website.

On Monday, January 15, those wishing to participate can join other families in celebrating Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. We will participate in the organized March downtown, with a Service Project at Chesterfield Academy on Wednesday, January 17th for families to have dinner together while also helping tutor students in math!

And we have our regularly scheduled Soup Kitchen on January 29th which is yet another opportunity for those seeking to express their Judaism by *doing acts of loving kindness and tikkun olam*.

The choice to rededicate ourselves

this New Year to our faith, beliefs and values is a courageous and sacred one. It is, I believe, what will create the change the world needs now more than ever. Despite the many reasons we can find to despair about our world, as a resilient people we can choose hope and rededicate ourselves to purposeful, just, living. We can be the light that burns in the darkness for others and for our world.

FAMILY LEARNING

Doing Justice in January

he OST Family Learning SubCommittee coined the headline "Justice January" because Judaism teaches the importance of working with others in the community to achieve social justice. OST Family Learning and Caring Subcommittees sponsor FOUR great opportunities in January to perform this Mitzvah.

OST's Justice January opportunities address a crisis of racial and economic inequality in the United States that the Union for Reform Judaism has formally recognized in its 2014 Resolution and its economic justice advocacy.

Hebrew scripture details for us one of the world's earliest social welfare systems. We are taught to leave the corners of our fields and the gleanings of our harvest to the poor (Leviticus 19:9), and to open our hands and lend to people whatever it is they need (Deuteronomy 7-11). We learn that helping fellow human beings in need, *tzedakah*, is not simply a matter of charity, but of responsibility, righteousness, and justice. The Bible does not merely command us to give to the poor, but to advocate on their behalf. We are told in Proverbs 31:9, to "speak up, judge righteously, champion the poor and the needy."

Writing as a former practicing attorney in the justice system, and a community justice advocate, I have witnessed that the heart of real justice is an understanding of "V'ahavta L'Reiacha Kamocha" (Lev. 19:18) 'Love your neighbor/brother/ kinsman as yourself.' The act of doing justice is a learning experience, because those who "do justice" see themselves in others. We who do justice learn about ourselves from others, and come to love our neighbors just as we love ourselves. Conversely, a miscarriage of justice frequently grows out of the incapacity to love our neighbors as ourselves, and an unconscious self-loathing. Temple invites you to DO JUSTICE in January at one or more of these opportunities. With an open mind, we can learn and love, about ourselves and our community.

If you have assets, you'll want to be the one to decide how they should be divided... at any age.

7. I will need to hire a lawyer. There are many Legacy gift vehicles that don't require hiring an attorney. Consider making Ohef Sholom Temple a beneficiary of a portion of your life insurance policy or retirement fund. This change can usually be made with a single phone call and a signature, no attorney necessary.

YOUR LEGACY is preserved for future generations by honoring your wishes as responsibly as possible. That's why we have a separate board from that of Ohef Sholom Temple. That extra layer insulates our endowment gifts from annual giving for current expenses. You can be confident that your legacy gift will be managed appropriately.

6. I won't get to decide what happens to my gift. Even though you won't be here to see the impact your legacy gift will be making, you can pre-determine where your dollars will go and stipulate how they should be spent. If you'd like to fund a technology upgrade, purchase books for the library, or make sure extra scholarships are available, just stipulate that as part of your gift. Don't imagine that you have to restrict your gift though... sometimes general funding is just the thing that an organization most needs.

5. If the organization dissolves, so will my money. It's hard to predict where any of us will be in 10, 20, even 50 years. If you are worried that your organization might not be around when your gift is ready, you can indicate that you'd like it to go to a particular cause (Jewish education) as a second choice to your favorite organization (Ohef Sholom Temple).

4. My kids are getting all my money. Every parent wants to make sure their kids are well taken care of. Consider leaving just a portion of your estate to charitable causes. A gift like this will leave your children with both financial support and an ethical lesson in the importance building a better world.

3. I might need my money. It's true, you might. And it'll be there for you if and when you do. This type of gift represents what you want to give once you are no longer here to need your assets.

2. I want my money to go where it's most needed. 
