CLERGY CORNER

From Pesach to Passover: Imbuing our Ancient Rituals with Meaning

s the month of March comes to a close, Jewish people worldwide observe the Festival of Passover. The Seders we have come to love (because of the food, family, friends, and familiar symbols and rituals) are celebrated by 96% of all Jews. Indeed, Passover is marked by more of our people than any other Jewish event during the year.

But it wasn't always this way. Contrary to popular belief, the holiday is not called Passover because the angel of death "passed over" the houses of the Israelites during the tenth plague on Egypt - the killing of the firstborn. It is called Passover, from the Hebrew word, Pesach, meaning paschal lamb, whose blood was used to paint the Israelite doorposts and lintels thus alerting the demon of their presence within. In Hebrew, the three-letter root of the work Pesach, paschal lamb, is the same as for the word pasach - passed over. In fact, in the Torah every Israelite household is commanded to sacrifice and consume a paschal lamb - a pesach - during the festival and that is how the holiday was observed from the exodus from Egypt (approximately 3500 BC) to the first century.

It was the destruction of the Temple and the influence of the Greeks and Romans that transformed Pesach into the holiday we know and love today. Our Seder was modeled on the Greek and Roman Symposia of the day, in which they dined, drank wine, and discussed philosophy and politics while reclining. Rather than an ancient rite requiring the killing of an animal, Pesach was transformed into an opportunity to re-enact our enslavement in, and freedom from, Egypt, while offering us a chance to think about the ultimate

redemption: freedom for all God's children. This freedom -- being our endgame -- is why we conclude our meals with "Next Year in Jerusalem," which is the fulfillment of our messianic hope of a peaceful world for all.

The symbols -- the parsley, salt water, egg, charoset, horseradish, and shank bone -- are all means to an end. They invite us to ask questions (particularly the children in our community) and to fulfill the commandment of "seeing ourselves as if we went forth from Egypt." Transmitting our meta-story to the next generation is another value realized through the re-telling -- our responsibility as Jews is to work for the betterment of our world so that all might one day be free.

The rabbis who re-framed Pesach were actually good Reform Jews. They saw an ancient ritual that might not hold import for their current community and they re-invented it in a way that was both authentic and meaningful, so much so that we observe it 2,000 years later.

As you celebrate Pesach this year, I encourage you to think about this transformation and the ways in which you and your family can engage in Tikun Olam, the repair of our world. Then when we open the door for Elijah, the precursor of the messianic era, we might truly hasten the world for which we all pray.

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

It's always been this way.

can't tell you how many times I have heard, "it's always been this way." I struggle with this thinking when grappling with organizational issues I have seen for many years, more clearly recently, as my leadership in Temple life has deepened. On many levels I can agree with this statement; however, on many others I cannot. Past Presidents and leaders of our sacred community have always struggled with the question of how to meet the needs of our congregation with a limited amount of resources. Our desire and commitment to making Ohef Sholom A House of Prayer for All Peoples mean we are fully inclusive, on all levels, notwithstanding financial concerns. This becomes a very challenging proposition when costs continue to rise while congregants' incomes do not, there is a decrease in real dollars, young people face college debt like never before, affiliation rates have decreased significantly, a beloved building is aging (as is our membership), and our demographics are such that a majority of our congregation does not live near our home. Not to mention, since 2008, there are twice as many worthy not-for-profit organizations vying for our community's dollars.

Times have changed. The world we are in is not the world of even 10 years ago. Significant changes have taken place and though challenges can mimic those of the past, our internal and external world is vastly different. We live in a fast-paced present that makes it difficult for a nearly 175-year-old organization, like Ohef Sholom, to adapt and remain relevant to younger generations with different needs. I, much like my 80*-year-old parents, have wanted to throw my hands up in despair and protest - a fearful reaction to the feeling of being left behind. For in the words of author John Steinbeck, "It is the nature of man as he grows older to protest against change, particularly change for the better." Rather than despair, I have made the conscious decision to embrace the discomfort that change brings and adapt to it, to the best of my ability, with gratitude as my guide to look for opportunities, rather than see only challenges. Of course, some days this is easier said than done!

All change is about movement, both on an individual level and an organizational one. To function at our higher level we must move away from turmoil and toward opportunity. As stated in the book Try Different, Not Harder, "In today's rapidly changing world, if you always do what you've always done, you'll get less than you've always gotten."

So where do we go from here for answers? "Listéning" was a buzz word at the URJ Biennial and throughout the articles I consume (and send to others daily, sorry for that!) There is no silver bullet, no one right answer, no program or supreme strategy that will address all of our challenges, but we must ask the tough questions and listen to the honest answers, to start. Trying different approaches, experimenting and piloting new initiatives, learning from our own failures & successes and those of others, will help us in "failing forward." One of the things that holds us back from trying different, is that repetitive methodologies propagate comfort, whereas the unknown is a vulnerable place.

We think "the way we've been doing things has been good enough, so more of the same should be better." Just when we need to be letting go of the old, the uncertainty of change makes us grip it ever more tightly.

Fighting our natural urge to resist change and replacing it with a willingness to try new ways and means of doing things will allow us to innovate. Our goal is not to do more with less, but to do more by doing it differently. It doesn't mean an "either/or, out with the old, in with the new strategy," but rather, an honest assessment of what is working, and what is not. By definition, adapting is "to change, or the process of change, by which an organism or species becomes better suited to its environment."

Listening is a big part of communication. Communication is the cornerstone of change. Without constant, consistent communication, change creates division, confusion, and distrust. Though so many avenues exist today that allow us to communicate, it has not been a strength of ours. We recognize and accept the need to become better at this going forward. Our main tools for communicating to you are our monthly bulletin *The Temple POST*, our weekly email *As the Temple Turns*, via social media like Facebook, and through our website, but they have lacked in meeting the needs of younger generations who

have grown up in the information age. We are working hard to be better communicators and are open to your suggestions on how we can accomplish this. My "Meet the President" sign ups was intentionally aimed at opening the lines of communication with you. I am here to serve you, and I hope more of you will take the opportunity to meet and talk with me.

With great optimism and hope, I have faith and find great comfort that a Presence greater than us is guiding us. When we respectfully listen and honestly reflect, a way forward will emerge. Staying focused on the journey, rather than the destination, is what is most important. We must let our Long Range Vision, "To Honor the Past, Embrace Change, and Live our Jewish Values," guide us on our journey.

We don't necessarily arrive at our destination by always knowing where we are going. Creation - as in that of a work of art or similar pursuit - is a process. The unfolding of the process, allows for things to appear that did not previously exist, and so, by default, chaos becomes clarity. What is clear, and what gives me purpose these days, is the belief that we need Judaism's teachings. We need a generation, a future, that is committed to pursuing and living the values it stands for through action. For what is at stake is more than just a Jewish future, but the future of our world. We intentionally recommitted ourselves to this when we signed the Brit Olam. I look forward to our working together to embrace the changes necessary for us to get on with this sacred task!

A Dues To Do List

The importance of dues for our Temple's financial health cannot be over-emphasized. The dues base pays for 80% of our annual operating budget. The phrase "sustaining dues" (family membership \$1,950.00 per year and \$1,350.00 for an individual) is misleading. In fact, the Temple could not properly function if it did not have endowment and other sources of income to operate. I ask each congregant to consider what more they can do to sustain the Temple.

Many of us have not increased our dues in years. Please consider an increase in your dues, whether moving from something below the sustaining level up to sustaining, or if you are at sustaining, perhaps moving higher, possibly even to the Pillars levels. In order for Ohef Sholom to continue to be a vibrant House of Prayer for all Peoples, it is critical that each of us step up, and then step up again, to the extent we are able. I would be happy to discuss dues with you or you can talk to someone in the office, including Linda Peck. Add a mitzvah to your tzedakah by reaching out to voluntarily increase your annual gift without being asked.

Another way to consider helping the Temple community thrive in the future is to consider making a gift to the Temple foundation. Right now we have a program trying to encourage LIFE & LEGACY gifts. The endowment we hope will replace an even greater percentage of the annual budget in the future. I have recently met with the LIFE & LEGACY team and have learned that my life insurance gift to Ohef Sholom Temple can be matched by about 35% through the Foundation. For a fairly reasonable amount per year, Monica and I can replace our dues perpetually, after we are gone, through this gift. Please consider contacting one of the folks working on the LIFE & LEGACY program, including Matthew Fine, to discuss what you may be able to do to keep Ohef Sholom strong for the next generation.

A further thought I have about how to help Temple with its dues base is to increase your activity and participation in Ohef Sholom's programming and events. By engaging yourself, you will get lots of benefits, including increasing the enjoyment level for everyone. If we can get more people excited about Temple, inevitably, it will also mean increased membership and increased dues.

This is my list of personal "dues to dos" as a fellow congregant. I hope that you will consider what you can do. As you move forward in 2018, please help Ohef Sholom Temple be a continuing and vibrant force for Jews and the broader community of Hampton Roads, Virginia.



CARING COMMITTEE

In reading Aish.com, I came across an article by the child of a Holocaust survivor, Slovie Jungreis-Wolff, who offered her reflections on Purim and its teachings in response to anti-Semitism. The following excerpt struck me as particularly relevant today:

"As we contemplate the rising anti-Semitism that is spreading throughout the world... Let us never give up hope. Instead, let us embrace the words of Queen Esther. 'Go, gather all the Jews'. Become one. Reach out to someone with kindness. Make a difference in the life of another, even if it's just through a good word or a bright smile... Together, we can turn sorrow to gladness and darkness to light."

And as I write this article for our March bulletin on Super Bowl Sunday, here's some "food for thought": Did you know that the owners of both competing teams: the Philadelphia Eagles (Jeffrey Lurie) and the New England Patriots (Robert Kraft) are Jewish, as is the owner of the team whose stadium will be the site of the game, the Minnesota Vikings (Mark Wilf)? All three men hew admirably to Jewish values: Kraft as a major Jewish philanthropist, Lurie as a "cultural Jew," and Wilf, whose parents are Holocaust Survivors. In addition to donating millions over the last 50 years to Israeli and Jewish causes, Wilf's team arranged for a powerful Jewish-themed exhibit, "Transfer of Memory" to be installed in Minneapolis's airport for the period leading up to the Super Bowl, ensuring the thousands of people (not just Jews) arriving for the big game would be offered greater awareness of the historical impact of the Holocaust. It is heartening to see these wealthy and powerful individuals using their money and positions as gifts for good.

We previously mentioned our gratitude to our NEST volunteers but we also want to thank the following staff and donors: Linda Peck and Karen Fine authorized keeping our Temple open later during



the snow storm so that our guests could stay until the day shelter was open. Jim Gurlea trudged over at 6:00am – shovel in hand-clearing a path for our guests. Jim came every day in the cold to make sure our Temple stayed clean and warm for our guests. As mentioned before we had lots of congregants who trudged through the snow to monitor and feed our guests- the week would have been a disaster without these brave souls.

In addition we had generous donors who provided funds as well as food and clothing for our guests. They included: Debbie Keelingbesides her generous monetary contribution she also donated lip balm and bus tickets; Rob Rostov and his sister Ellen Rostov Hundley (and their families) provided all the supplies and cooked an incredible dinner for our guests; Charles Greenhood (Brutti's Catering) - donated 5 large breakfast casseroles that fed our guests for 5 mornings; Nicole and Michael Rosenblum- donated enough fruit for 2 lunches as well as hats and gloves; Robin Lewis-Schoner collected as well as purchased socks and underwear for all of our guests; Sisterhood cooked and served Tuesday night's meal; Diane Muhlendorf donated 10 brand new blankets; Laura Gilbert made and donated over 100 scarves.


