CLERGY CORNER

What is Shavuot aka Sh'vuus?

Every biblically established Jewish holiday has both an agricultural and an historical significance. Shavuot, the festival during which we celebrate the late spring barley harvest is no different. Occurring seven weeks and a day after the second day of Passover, Shavuot or Sh'vuus (the Ashkenazi pronunciation with which many of you are familiar) also commemorates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai some 4,000 years ago. Just as our ancestors awaited its arrival, staying up all night long in anticipation of God's revelation, it is customary for us to study Torah (this year the evening of May 19 - May 20) all night long as well. It is an opportunity to reflect on the awesome significance of the Torah in our lives and what a gift from God and our forbearers it is. How many peoples have a moral guide for living that has remained both evolved and remained relevant for millennium!?! We may have our flaws, but we Jews still do our utmost to behave ethically and to better our world in the process.

For the past 100 years or so, Reform Jews have observed this Festival in a unique way. It is the date we have chosen to celebrate the Confirmation of our tenth grade students. Just as our ancestors offered the first fruits of their barley harvest to God in thanksgiving and for well-being, we offer our best and brightest. In a moving service of their own writing, our students stand upon our bema (today's Mount Sinai) and affirm their acceptance of and commitment to Torah and to the Jewish community. Expressing their Jewish identities in their own words, they remind us of why our heritage is so

precious and so worth living and so vital to pass on to future generations. I urge you to attend this congregational milestone event on Saturday, May 19 at 10:30 am in the Sanctuary. Whether your faith and commitment are strong or wavering, you will be inspired anew and find your Judaism re-affirmed through their eyes.

This year, we will also offer our adults a unique opportunity to observe this holiday. On Sunday, May 20, we invite you to join us for a Shavuot experience that will include a reading and study of the Book of Ruth (the scroll we read on Shavuot) led by Cantor Jen, a gnocchi and four cheese sauce making activity and dinner taught by Mamma's Kitchen, a brief Torah study (with wine) led by me while dining, culminating in a candle lighting Torah and Havdallah Ceremony with your own opportunity to affirm what Torah means to you. There will be some children's activities available as well and you will be able to attend the entire event or any parts of it -- look for information in this Temple pOST and in *As the Temple Turns*.

In closing, *Chag Sameach*, I wish for you and those you love a joyous Festival of Shavuot. May the Torah continue to inspire us to lives of goodness and blessing this year and always,



A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

I love to read, which was not always the case! I'm also one who likes and needs lots of information in order to properly assess a situation or problem. The "puzzle" of Temple life has, honestly, been fascinating to me, and as such I have gathered lots of information on the topic; I call this the "arena" I spend a good part of my life in these days! We wrestle with the business and the spiritual sides of Temple, always trying to keep in the forefront our values, mission, and the idea of sacred partnership. It is a challenge to balance all of these. I am constantly searching, seeking, and contemplating answers and solutions to this "puzzle" and to the challenges we and most Jewish institutions are facing.

In *Finding a Spiritual Home: How a New Generation of Jews Can Transform the American Synagogue*, Rabbi Sydney Shwarz writes, "the contemporary American Jewish community is a strange paradox reflecting both serious danger signs about its future viability, and also exciting signs of a Jewish renaissance." He goes on to examine and explore the evolution of the American synagogue in an effort to better understand and give context to how we got to the synagogues of today. He then offers examples of four congregations and how they are responding to meet the needs of the new generation of Jews. He refers to this paradigm shift in American synagogues as a move from synagogue-center to synagogue communities that are characterized by eight generational themes. The Baby Boom generation represents one of the most dramatic cultural shifts in American history. The case is made for how imperative it is to understand what drives this generation. Only with this understanding can synagogues respond appropriately to the needs of the Baby Boomers, who are truly our future. And their needs are significantly different than the generations before them.

As with anything, how we perceive these events and challenges is critical to how we will manage and respond to them. Life can be no more or less than we make of it. A shift in perspective is all it takes to change our world, but adopting an optimistic and hopeful mindset is necessary. We must concurrently divest ourselves of preconceived notions of what is good and bad, an "either-or" thinking, and keep an open mind by adopting an "and-also" attitude and choose to focus on the opportunities that change can offer.

We must also accept and embrace a culture of experimentation as well as the concept of failure. Not because failure is a good thing or the goal, but because it's a natural part of the path of progress. If you're failing, at least that means you're trying. Not trying is the kind of failure that keeps you stuck. I've often said, "I may not know exactly where we are going, but I know for sure which direction we are not going... the

way it's been done!"

The organizational culture of any institution affects everything that happens in it. It is said that culture "is the hardest thing to establish and the hardest thing to change." And similarly, "Culture eats strategy for breakfast." To me this means that if the organizational culture does not support the change and those who are trying to effect the change, no plan - no matter how well thought out - stands a chance.

I am so proud of the efforts our board, staff and clergy have made this year in creating a new organizational culture. We dedicated ourselves to this task, and it has made such a positive difference. Without it, I honestly believe we could not bring about real and lasting change. We so often forget to give "thanks" to those closest to us and the ones who work the hardest. I'd like to take this opportunity to publicly "thank" the board, Rabbi Roz and Cantor Jen, and Linda and her team of staff members, for their hard work this past year and for their willingness to truly live the vision we laid out in our Long Range Plan last year: To honor the past, embrace change, and live our values. We may not have done all of it perfectly, but we have all tried our best. In the words of Theodore Roosevelt:

It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat.

My wholehearted gratitude to all of you for showing up and being with me in the arena this year. It has been my honor and privilege to work alongside all of you and learn from you. Here's to us embracing the opportunities that come with change. I have faith that they will be better than we can even imagine.

HONORING GAIL BACHMAN

Gail Bachman has walked the halls of Ohef Sholom Temple in many roles: a child learning about Judaism, a teacher instilling Jewish knowledge, a youth group advisor, the principal of the Religious School and as the Administrator of the Temple. She especially cherished her extra title of "Temple Mom," and when she was called on for advice or as a shoulder to lean on.

Most recently, she has been volunteering her time with the Archives Committee, helping to ensure the next generations of the Jewish community in Norfolk remember those who came before. As Gail says, "You have to know where you came from."

Her commitment to Ohef Sholom runs deep: she's the fourth generation of her family to be part of the synagogue community. Being here is in her blood. Her roots are in Norfolk.

"I just remember going to Sunday School as what we did on Sunday mornings," she said. "It's how I grew up. It's how my children grew up."

As soon as she was old enough, she helped her mother, Ruth Wasserman, who ran the Religious School. Gail's weekends were spent in the classroom. Since the school didn't have enough rooms for all students to attend on Sunday, the older students attended on Saturday. So Gail was able to be a student one day and a teaching assistant the next. Eventually, she became a teacher, which she did happily for more than 20 years, during which time she also spent several years as youth group advisor. Then, for about 20 years, she proudly led the Religious School, the largest in the region at the time.

The apple doesn't fall far from her family tree: she's following in the footsteps of her grandmother, Reba Cohen, too, who ran the Sunday school at her synagogue in Charleston, West Virginia, for 40 years.

Gail's seen our community grow and change over time. However, for her, the central part of Jewish education is still about helping establish each one's own Jewish identity. So, although education, children, parents and even priorities have changed, it is even more important for us to provide opportunities for our community to grow together. With the congregation more diverse and spread out geographically than ever, it is vital for us to remain as a constant, providing the types of education that reaches and teaches our families, she believes.

"One of my goals throughout the years was to always be very warm and welcoming to each and everyone who entered Ohef Sholom," she said.

Gail worked hard to get to know the families and build relationships with them. That was true of her life outside Temple, too. She taught in Norfolk Public Schools for 31 years and always got involved in and supported the activities of her three sons, John, David and Brian. Often that meant weekends were spent preparing for and running the Religious School as well as juggling the responsibilities of managing and staffing the concession stand at Little League games. Gail and Tom's sons became B'nai Mitzvah and completed confirmation at Temple. All three also followed family tradition and were assistants and then teachers in the school. Gail often said that going to Religious School through confirmation was Tom's and her choice but continuing after confirmation was their choice.

She recalled the two years when the Temple was under construction and Sunday classes were held at ECPI. Each Sunday, Gail and Tom left home very early so they could bring the coolers of apple juice and cream cheese, pick up

the bagels and get to ECPI in plenty of time to set up the classrooms and prepare rooms so things were ready when the students arrived. It was a great relief when, in 2005, they moved back to their home, Ohef Sholom. It was also very gratifying to see how the enrollment greatly increased once they were back in their new building.

Education Committee Chairman Joash Schulman said he's come to appreciate her insight and warm presence.

"I've been very fortunate to come to know her more closely as I assumed the role of Education Committee chair. She is a bridge between generations. Her wealth of knowledge and experience, her deep family roots at OST, and decades-long dedication make her a very special treasure for our community," he said.



One of the things that touches her heart is seeing the students she taught grow and take pride in their accomplishments. Observing the older teens working with the younger children, as she once did, also brings her joy. Her favorite service is the confirmation service, because she says it is so heartwarming witnessing the students making the service their own and knowing the future of Judaism is in such good hands.

Gail was honored as the 2009 Tidewater Educator of the Year and has earned two longevity awards. In 1985, she received a Chai Award for 18 years of service to the local Jewish education community, and then again, 18 years later, she earned the Double Chai Award. This was newly created to honor fellow educator Virginia Rosen, of blessed memory, and Gail for their 36 years of service.

President Karen Fine reflected on Gail's service to Ohef Sholom:

"Gail has been an integral part of my experience at Ohef Sholom," she said. "She welcomed me as a new member, then as a new parent, and then encouraged my getting involved as a lay leader. Her kindness of heart and humbleness of spirit are an inspiration to me. She has given so much of herself to Ohef Sholom, it is as much a part of her as she is of it. Gail deserves our abundant praise and sincere gratitude for helping us to be the welcoming community we are."

Gail has never wavered in her dedication to OST. She's involved in OST's Sisterhood, which was important to her mother and grandmother, the Education Committee, the Family Learning sub-Committee, the Membership and the Archives Committee, which was important to her father.

To say she has pride in her Temple community would be a great understatement.

"Temple is my heart," Gail said.

We look forward to honoring Gail's decades of service and dedication to Ohef Sholom at the Annual Congregational Meeting on May 17th where we will officially rename the Religious School Relief Fund, the Gail Wasserman Bachman Education Fund. Please join us in celebrating Gail!




