

Thanksgiving finds its basis in Sukkot. The Pilgrims based their first celebration on Deuteronomy 16's description of Sukkot. Today, as much as Thanksgiving is an American holiday, we can

also imbue it with Jewish meaning.

I find this aspect of Thanksgiving particularly beautiful. While my family celebrates Thanksgiving through a Jewish lens, I know that my neighbors are celebrating through their own particular faith and ethnic traditions. It is the only American holiday that so easily brings our community together, while allowing us to also celebrate our diversity in a natural, and not forced, manner.

Here are a few ways in particular to imbue your Thanksgiving with Judaism:

Begin and end your meal with the traditional prayers for meal time.

Recite Psalm 100, a prayer of Thanksgiving.

Recite the Thanksgiving prayer below, taken from On the Doorpost of your House, CCAR Press

Engage your family in a discussion of the Pilgrims and religious freedom in America. William Bradford, the second governor of the Plymouth Colony, was often compared to Moses, and the Colony itself has been called "little Israel" by historians. William Bradford knew Hebrew and in his history of Plymouth Plantation included Biblical quotations in the original Hebrew! Start the dinner by going around the table and letting each person say something for which they are thankful. This is not specifically a Jewish tradition, but a meaningful one that reflects Jewish values.

Collect tzedakah or engage in a family mitzvah project during the Thanksgiving weekend. Volunteer at soup kitchen, participate in a park clean-up, visit a senior facility or hospital together.

Make a dish from our Jewish tradition for the Thanksgiving table.

 Two great children's books about
Thanksgiving are Molly's Pilgrim and Rivka's First Thanksgiving.

I wish you a very joyful and meaningful Thanksgiving!



Mama Doni is also one of the original recording artists in Behrman House publisher's new *Hebrew in Harmony* curriculum, which our Temple has adopted this year. We are teaching parts of *Hebrew in Harmony* to our primary level learners before they

begin formal Hebrew classes, as well as to our 3rd, 4th & 5th grade (*Alef, Bet and Gimmel*) Hebrew studies classes. Three of our Hebrew teachers are taking the on-line *Hebrew in Harmony* training this summer and fall.

In short, the concert combines worship, learning, music and fun in a communal Shabbat experience Friday night, November 18, 2016.

OSTY FOOD DRIVE



You could almost count on it when you came to Ohef Sholom Temple for the high holidays.

When you leave Rosh Hashanah services, an OSTY representative would hand you a paper grocery bag and instruct you to bring it back filled with non-perishable items on Yom Kippur.

Well, it's safe to say that Ohef Sholom members answered the call this year.

More than 3,000 pounds of food was collected to be donated to the Food Bank of Southeastern Virginia, Jewish Family Service, and OST's own soup kitchen.

Some of the OSTY Board reflected on why the drive is important to them:

"The OSTY annual food drive is one of the most important social action projects of the year," said OSTY President Ginger Johns. "It benefits the Food Bank, Jewish Family Service, and the soup kitchen at Ohef Sholom Temple. We end up collecting hundreds of cans that go out to families in need of food in the Tidewater area. It's a really great project to incorporate all of the temple members within our temple community and is a great way for us to reach out to our community members in need."

For board members Miles Fine and Sophie Waldman, it's about the bigger picture.

"Well I feel like since as a country we're just trying to solve all of these problems overseas," Fine said. "But there's problems still here at home, like people not having food, and I feel like that's just a basic necessity, so I feel like that it's important that we give people food," he said.

Waldman agreed.

"The food drive is important because there's so many people in our country and in our community who don't have food and it's a necessity that everyone should have, whether it's in our country and out, and we're just trying to do what's important to help everyone," she said.

The work for OSTY starts before you see those bags at services, though. The group seeks the bag donations from Trader Joe's in Virginia Beach, then copies and staples fliers to the bags, all before the apples and honey are set on the Rosh Hashanah table.

The drive wouldn't be possible without the generosity of Linda Fox-Jarvis and her moving truck, either.

"I was glad to see how well the congregation pitched in and how much they donated," said Paul Weiner, one of the new teen advisers. "I'm glad to have joined this community."

CONNECTING WITHIN OUR CONGREGATION

I unearthed a remarkable fact about Ohef Sholom Temple congregants over the last year: MANY of us are quietly going about the work of environmental stewardship **individually**. Some as we make choices about whether to recycle or reuse items instead of sending trash to a land fill. Some of us live on the water and opt to create "living shorelines" instead of bulkheads or sea walls to enable more habitat creation, and ultimately to better protect our properties from sea level rise and storms. Others are master gardeners and master naturalists, and engage in public education about the importance of plants and habitats to the human wellbeing. Still others were the founders of the remarkable local environmental organization, Lynnhaven River NOW.

The joy of being part of a congregation is that we get to bring ourselves, the individual, into the collective. And this is exactly what the Eco-Judaism Subcommittee sought to do this year – gather those of us who are in awe of the natural world/Creation, and as a congregation, begin engaging in stewardship activities **together**.

In doing so, we accomplished so much in 5776:

- Signed up 75 Ohef Sholom Bay Saver homes with congregants committing to make small changes that will lead to big impacts on our environment.
- Hosted a Carpool Café open to the broader community about environmental stewardship in our community with TFC Recycling, Lynnhaven River NOW, Elizabeth River Project, and our own native plant enthusiast/Master Gardener, Mary Ann Nadler. Lynnhaven River NOW staff taught a concurrent stewardship lesson to Sunday Morning Learners.
- Became the **first Jewish organization** to be an Elizabeth River Project River Star Business.
- Cleaned the beach at Sarah Constant Park during NFTY-MAR's TheVent.
- Planted a native plant garden along Redgate Avenue, and certified it a Monarch Waystation.
- Started a Sunday Morning Learning food composting program with a grant from the Religious Action Center of the URJ.
- Became the **first Jewish organization** to hold an event at the Brock Environmental Center, operated by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.

On September 25, we celebrated the culmination of our Eco-Judaism efforts when some 300 members of our congregation became Sunday learners at the Brock Environmental Center for our annual congregational picnic. In a beautiful and inspiring location and perfect weather, congregants of all ages and multiple generations of the same families, reconnected with old friends and made new acquaintances, ate Doumars ice cream cones, and learned from other congregants about unique ways they can attract wildlife to their yards and be effective environmental stewards in their homes. **Leslie Friedman** generously contributed the funds for all of the food and activities. Lynnhaven River NOW co-sponsored and planned the picnic with us.

The overall feeling of the picnic was one of hope and community. Laughter and fun combined with excellent environmental learning in a Jewish context. Being inside the Brock Environmental Center, the most sustainable building in Virginia and among the greenest in the world, tangibly demonstrated what a community can achieve with a vision and passion.

What does 5777 have in store for us? Each of us identifying and committing to a small change in our lives to benefit the world makes a significant difference. But when we turn in to one another and do this work together, we elevate the work and meaning to a new level. Repairing the world, *tikkun olam*, enhances our connection to ourselves, one another, and God.

Competing with professional chefs and other great cooks, our team won Second Place in the Amateur category with its entry of fantastic Matzo Ball Soup. Sharon Ross, the Chair of our Caring Committee,



coordinated the effort. The soup base was made by Kitty Wolf, and a number of others made Matzo balls to go in the soup. Delicious matzo balls were contributed by Sharon, Debbie Keeling, Bonnie Kerner, Debbie Moore, and Paula Russel. The group also served the soup, which got rave reviews at the Cook Off and Auction.



During this month leading up to Thanksgiving it is customary to reflect on how much we have for which to be grateful: good health, nourishing food, a warm house and cozy bed. In contrast, we know that the homeless are usually lacking in all of these. Sadly these people are our neighbors- we only have to look down our streets to see them carrying their bags. OST has 2 programs and we would like to initiate a third to help our homeless friends.

The **OST Soup Kitchen** is truly something to experience-I like to call it "**Magical Mondays**." Founded and directed by Dorianne Villani (*dvillani@cox.net*), the Soup Kitchen not only serves a nutritious hot meal, but also provides toiletries, clothing, backpacks, shoes, blankets and now free haircuts. Dorianne has her "devoted volunteers," but for the most part it is a changing group- one that **you** are always welcome to join- once or every month. The Soup Kitchen is always the **last Monday of the month**- from **9:30 am to 1:30 pm**. Our next one is **November 28, 2016**.

Our **NEST** program is celebrating its 11th year at OSTbut many of you may not understand what NEST is or why this is important to our Temple. NEST stands for Norfolk Emergency Shelter Team and consists of almost 40 congregations in Norfolk and Chesapeake that house the homeless during the coldest months of the year- usually November through March. Our guests are fed dinner and then sleep on mats in Kaufman Hall. Before they leave, they get a hot breakfast and a bag lunch. Our dates for this year are January 4 -11. We still partner with Ghent United Methodist but they have become less active due to the poor health of their



chairperson. Many of you have heard my pleas for help during the overnight shift- it is so easy.... you just bring your book and laptop and catch up on your reading. We always have 2-3 volunteers plus a police officer- so it's completely safe. Please contact me to tell me what shift you would like!

In addition to these ongoing programs, we would like to garner more support for Virginia Supportive Housing (VSH). This program "cures" homelessnessour friends are assigned a small room with a bed and a few chairs- and they can live there for as long as they need to. VSH does get money from state and federal grants but they need financial support to help the new residents become established in their new home. They need linens, towels, cleaning supplies and other household items. This would be a great project for a B'nei Mitzvah or a scout troop.
