A Word from Rabbi Steinberg

Telling Stories

Researchers have begun to establish a causal link between storytelling and thriving. In 2001, psychologists compared children's psychological health with their knowledge of their own family history. They measured this knowledge on a "Do You Know?" scale using questions like:

- Do you know where your grandparents met? Your parents?
- Do you know of an illness or something really terrible that happened in your family?
- Do you know what went on when you were being born?

The results surprised even the researchers. They found: "The more children knew about their family's history, the stronger their sense of control over their lives, the higher their self-esteem, and the more successfully they believed their families functioned. The "Do You Know?" scale turned out to be the best single predictor of children's emotional health and happiness."

Two months after this study was conducted, the September 11 attacks occurred. The psychologists went back and studied how the same group of children responded to that trauma. The results were the same: "The ones who knew more about their families proved to be more resilient, meaning they could moderate the effects of stress."

To explain the connection between story and resilience, the psychologists coined the term "intergenerational self." It's a sense that you're part of something bigger, that your life is an episode in a larger narrative. Marshall Duke, one of the study's authors and a professor at Emory University, who also happens to be Jewish, compared this idea to a *bubbemeise*, Yiddish for "grandmother's tale." In his family, Duke recounts, the grandmother will say, "'You're having trouble with math, kid? Let me tell you, your father had trouble with math. You don't want to practice piano? Boy, your aunt Laura didn't want to practice piano, either.' Whatever problem the child has, the grandmother has a story for it-even if it's made up!"

More than just entertain and amuse, these cross-generational stories serve a higher purpose. Family stories let children know that they're not alone, and that those who came before them celebrated triumphs and overcame struggles, just as they do. The researchers define three types of family narratives. The ascending narrative says, we came from nothing and now we've succeeded. The descending narrative says, we used to have it all and now we have nothing. Finally, "the most healthful narrative . . . called the oscillating family narrative," says we've had ups and downs, and we've persevered, as a family. This third narrative is, indeed, the story of the Jewish people.

During the course of this coming year, you'll have many opportunities to tell children and grandchildren our Jewish Story. Children's Services, all age-appropriate educational events, and holiday programs are perfect times.

When we sit around the Passover seder table each year, we invite the next generation into the Jewish family story. As the Mishnah (P'sachim 10:5) teaches, "In each generation the individual is obligated to see himself as though he [himself] left Egypt, as it is written: "And you shall explain to your child on that day, 'It is because of what the Eternal did for me when I went free from Egypt' (Exodus 13:8)." We need not limited this story to seder celebrations.

This is our story, we say to our children. This is your story: You are part of the unfolding narrative of the Jewish people, for better and for worse. Your ancestors sought answers to life's ultimate questions. They struggled and suffered, they thrived and rejoiced. Through it all, they strove to create a life of meaning and impact, to leave a legacy for us-for you. From them-from me-comes your inheritance: responsibility, to continue our story by becoming a storyteller yourself; resilience, to face life's challenges; and gratitude, to appreciate your blessings while being a blessing to the world.

This, and nothing less, is what it means to be a Jew.



Shalom Y'all,

WHEN I WAS YOUNGER, I ADMIRED PEOPLE WHO WERE SMART. AS I GROW OLDER, I ADMIRE PEOPLE WHO ARE KIND.

These words from a Dallas Rabbi at our last Union of Reform Judaism Biennial have haunted me for 2 years. There is such a Ring of Truth to them that one cannot get them out of one's mind. And why not? Studies prove that Association with Others is a major factor contributing to a **happy life**. One Harvard study found that a Monthly Association with a Group of Friends has the same effect upon you as a 100% Increase in your Income. The study's author concluded that the Only thing that matters in life are your **Relationships** with other people.

Which brings me to our Ohef Sholom Temple Sisterhood and Men's Club, which meet regularly each month, as well as our Friday night services and the regular Group of Friends who meet for dinner in PRIME TIME once a month following the services. We are here for

you and care about your well-being.

Recently, that precept was put to the test when a member of our congregation, **Hannah Galbraith**, was in a horrendous car accident out of state. Of the 6 people involved, she was one of 2 survivors. Her parents **Lori & Scott** (former Sisterhood and Men's Club Presidents) have been at her side ever since.

Once word of Hannah's condition got out (she was in a Dallas Critical Care Center), Random Acts of Kindness broke out within our congregation. Hannah's friend, **Blakely Cohen**, set up a Social Media site to inform others what was going on and established a *GoFundMe.com* page so that interested parties could contribute to help Lori & Scott get through this in their hour of need. **Rabbi Roz** spoke of the power of prayer and assigned Psalms (to be read daily) to aid us all in getting through this crisis. It has helped.

As not everyone is on Facebook, your Temple Men's Club established a fund to collect assistance from its Brotherhood. Our Sisterhood members formed their own group to take care of the Galbraith home, pay bills, and manage the home front while they were out of town. Another congregant volunteered to maintain their grounds. Thanks to **Robin Katz**, her Retail Store employer provided \$5 tickets toward *Shop for Cause* on August 29. Our Sisterhood sold the tickets and all the \$5 increments went toward Hannah's Care.

Not to be outdone, Blakely's mom, **Lisa Cohen**, along with **Rabbi Roz**, contacted the Dallas Reform Synagogue *Temple Shalom* (whose rabbi, coincidently, is responsible for the quote). They generously provided Service and Support to the Galbraiths throughout their ordeal.

This coordinated effort would not have been possible without **Shelley Rosenberg**, who created a comprehensive document of Resources, Contact Names, Phone #s, and Email Addresses for all the different realms of the Galbraiths' world. It enabled our volunteers to reach out to the appropriate people to determine their short term and long term needs & actions.

While this effort was not officially sponsored by the Temple, it is times like these that are what your Synagogue is here for. Your Temple Leadership is contributing to this worthy cause, yet None of this was requested, particularly by Hannah's parents. It is just that once a tragedy/near tragedy occurred to a member of our congregational family, **Acts of Loving Kindness** (*G'milut Chasadim* – 1 of the 3 Pillars of Judaism) broke out amongst our Members spontaneously. Now back in Virginia, Hannah has a long, slow recovery ahead of her but is making progress every week. Your prayers and Tzedakah have helped. Don't let anyone tell you something different.

Blakely & Lisa Cohen, Robin & David Katz, Rabbi Roz, Shelley Rosenberg, our Sisterhood & Men's Club are all Jewish Heroes in my book and worthy of all the Kudos you can bestow upon them.

Best wishes for a Full Recovery, Hannah! Your Temple Family is all behind you.

FAMILY LEARNING

BIG IDEAS and SPECIAL NEEDS In the IMAGE OF GOD - B'Tzelem Elohim בְּצֵלֶם אֱלֹהִים

At OST, we learn about BIG IDEAS Sunday mornings - ideas that enrich us and move us to action throughout the week. One BIG JEWISH IDEA from our *Torah* is *B'tzelem Elohim* – the idea that God created humanity "in the image of God." (Gen. 1:27) This idea from our creation story guides how

we approach learners with special needs.

The creatures of this world are a testament to the diversity of God's creation. Like snowflakes, we are all unique. That is one reason our temple founders engraved above our entrance, "a house of prayer for all peoples." We ALL have special needs. We all have different praying styles and learning styles. Some in our community have learning needs that demand a greater degree of individualized attention than others. In Monday through Friday schools in the U.S., such learners are entitled to federally mandated Individualized Education Plans (IEPs).

In 2012, OST began a special needs learning program called Open the Gates. Today, our Sunday learning community offers individualized services so that we ALL can learn about *TORAH* together.

Features of Open the Gates

- Jewish Individualized Education Plans (JIEPs) which we develop together with families and staff
- Virginia-certified Special Education Teacher, Heather Keller and Special Education Assistant, Karen Owens
- Teacher training, adaptive equipment, and materials to assist special learners
- A discrete, safe classroom for students who temporarily need to be in their own setting. We call it the *Sababa* Center. This is Hebrew for "It's cool."
- Madrichim employment opportunities for older teens with special needs

Goals of Open the Gates

- integrate special needs learners into communal learning experiences
- teach progressively increased independence, a.k.a.
 "ENDependence"
- enrich our community with all who are created in the image of God, and
- deepen our understanding of our Creator and ourselves

From a Jewish perspective, special education is not only about how a community accommodates an individual, but also how an individual inspires a community.

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHT: A PERIODIC FOCUS ON A TEMPLE COMMITTEE

This committee, which exists to identify and categorize the Temple's archival material as well as oversee the library, is taking on a larger role in the planning of OST's 175th anniversary and its concurrent exhibit.

To this end, the committee, chaired by past president Eddie Kramer and funded by several designated sources, is "vigorously engaged in the videotaping of members who've reached a certain age," says Committee member Ira Steingold. "Their keen insight into Reform Judaism and Hampton Roads for the last eight decades and beyond will enrich the history of OST's future archival information."

Another major committee project is digitizing the library. "We have very talented volunteers on the committee, willing and able to bring about this digital Renaissance," says Steingold. Accessing the collection through the ease of an Internet search would ideally engage young minds curious about the rich history of OST.



Did you know oyster shells are valuable? Adult oysters are the heroes of the Chesapeake Bay. They filter 50 GALLONS of water a day and make a significant impact on water quality. Baby oysters need oyster shells to attach to in order to grow; thus oyster shells need to be plentiful in the Bay. Instead of trashing them, some local restaurants save oyster and clam shells, which are then cleaned and used to build oyster reefs throughout the Bay. I am serving as the Chair of the LRPC and have as my Co-Chair, Sandy Forte-Nickenig.
