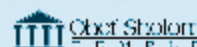

A Word from the Rabbi

In Honor of the Rebirth of Spring: What is Love?

During Shabbat Services on February 14th, Ohef Sholom celebrated milestone wedding anniversaries. At the suggestion of Lori Galbraith and the Worship Committee, we invited couples observing 5, 10, 15, 20, 25 . . . 65 years together to come to services and receive a special blessing. We weren't really sure who would come; but it turns out that at least twenty-five couples came together under a *chuppah*, proudly announcing the number of years they had been wed. It was inspiring to see those who had been married five years standing beside those who had been married fifty (and there were many), and every milestone in between, knowing full well that nothing is more difficult, or more gratifying, than making a committed relationship work.

Before offering a blessing, I posed the question, "What is Love?" and offered answers written by four to eight year olds. Since there is no wisdom greater than that "out of the mouths of babes," (and many of you have asked me for copies), they bear repeating here.

Answered Rebecca, age eight: When my grandmother got arthritis, she couldn't bend over and paint her toenails anymore. So my grandfather does it for her all the time, even when his hands got arthritis too. That's love.

Billy, age four, had this to say: When someone loves you, the way they say your name is different. You know that your name is safe in their mouth.

And for a bit of levity, Karl, age five, added: Love is when a girl puts on perfume and a boy puts on shaving cologne and they go out and smell each other.

Chrissy, who is six said: Love is when you go out to eat and give somebody most of your French fries without making them give you any of theirs.

For Terri, age four: Love is what makes you smile when you are tired.

And for Danny, age seven, it means: Love is when my mommy makes coffee for my daddy and she takes a sip before giving it to him, to make sure it tastes okay.

Emily, age eight, who has clearly been watching her parents a bit closer than they may realize says: Love is when you kiss all the time. Then when you get tired of kissing, you still want to be together and you talk more. My Mommy and Daddy are like that. They look gross when they kiss.

And even more profound is the observation of Bobby, age seven: Love is what's in the room with you at Chanukah if you stop opening the presents and listen.

Or Nikka, age six's, advice: If you want to learn how to love better, you should start with a friend you hate.

And a few more, this one from Noelle, age seven, and Tommy, age six: Love is when you tell a guy you like his shirt, and then he wears it every day.

Love is a little old woman and a little old man who are still friends after they know each other so well.

Skipping a few to the final answer, Jessica age eight reminds us: You really shouldn't say 'I love you' unless you mean it. But if you mean it, you should say it a lot. People forget.

Reflecting on these profound statements, we might conclude from the wisdom of these babes, that love is about selflessness, about doing things for another just because we love them, even if it is hard, or painful, or difficult or requires sacrifice; but never because we expect something back in return. We could add that love is genuinely liking your beloved, enjoying spending time with them whether kissing or talking. It is about accepting them for who they are and all that they are, and letting them know, by telling them or just through the tone of your voice, that you have their back and that they are safe. Love is lifting your partner up, whether by making them laugh or smile, encouraging them to be their best selves, to see themselves through your eyes -- respected, admired, adored. Love is weathering life's ups and downs with a partner and growing together better, more manageable and more fulfilling because you share in life's journey -- both its successes and failures -- with another.

Notice that, according to these kids, love may be some about physical intimacy -- lots of gross kissing and some smelling -- but it isn't about romance the way we think about it today. It's not about being swept off of our feet, or dazzled by money or gifts, or sweet-talked. It is about honor, respect, kindness, selflessness, presence and companionship in good times and bad. It is about commitment and duty.

Interestingly, while these kids are not likely Jewish, they have described the definition of love from Judaism's perspective to a tee. As one modern day Jewish matchmaker, Nehamma Biderman notes, matches are made on earth: "Falling in love is not a pre-requisite for marriage: love is the byproduct. The love comes after the marriage, when you come to know each other. It's like building a house, a stone on top of a stone. Understanding and honor, this is love."

As spring brings warmth and sunshine to our bodies, let our minds acknowledge and our hearts feel the love in our lives and all that for which we have to be grateful. Wishing you a Passover of meaning, fulfillment and peace,

Did you know...

The Passover seder is laden with symbols, many of which are found on the seder plate. In recent decades, there's been a new food on many a progressive platter: an orange.

Some may consider the orange a symbol of women's rights, derived from a man supposedly telling Professor Susannah Heschel that "a woman belongs on the bimah as much as an orange belongs on the seder plate." But Heschel herself has said that no such exchange took place, and the orange has a different meaning. Reflecting on when she added the orange to her seder plate in the 1980s, she says it was to be eaten "as a gesture of solidarity with Jewish lesbians and gay men, and others who are marginalized within the Jewish community," including widows. The seeds, symbolizing homophobia, were to be spat out.

Our second session of OST University – *The Nuts and Bolts of OST – Where does the money go?* – took place the end of February and was well attended. Since we are in the “budgeting season” for the Temple, and for those who were unable to attend, I thought I would touch on the highlights discussed about our Temple budget.

Our Budget Committee is currently in the middle of OST’s Budget process which involves analyzing where we are in our current fiscal in terms of “making budget,” as well as working on a proposed balanced budget for fiscal year 2014 - 2015. This budget will be presented to the OST Board for approval in April and then presented to the congregation for approval at our annual meeting on May 15, 2014. Our fiscal year begins on June 1 and ends on May 31.

Our Budget Committee works diligently every year from about December until April analyzing all of our expenses, as well as our sources of income, to ensure we are fiscally responsible and end the year in the “black.” As most of you know, the “dues” commitment paid by our members does not cover the Temple expenses, and the Religious and Hebrew School fees paid do not cover the cost of our wonderful Religious School. OST’s approximate yearly expenses are close to \$1,300,000. Our two largest expense categories are salaries and benefits (which account for 54% of expenses) and maintenance and general facility costs (which account for 23% of expenses). Our “dues” commitment income covers approximately 72% of our total expenses. The Religious School and Hebrew School fees collected cover about 64% of the cost to run our Religious School.

Thus the need for other sources of income: our annual fundraiser, our biennial Directory, income from the rental of our facility and equipment, memorial plaques and booklet, purchases of brass leaves for the Tree of Life, general donations, and the Ohef Sholom Foundation. We are very fortunate to have these sources of income so that we can continue to offer an amazing array of programs, hire the best staff, clergy & religious school educators, maintain our beautiful 100+ year old building/sanctuary and most importantly be a House of Prayer for all, regardless of financial situation.

Thank you so much to David Katz and Jay Legum for chairing this Committee and taking on this very important task. And thank you to Lawrence Steingold for all you do throughout the year as our amazing Treasurer and “volunteer accountant” to keep us on the right track.

During the OST University second session, we also talked about our constitution and bylaws, as well as our organizational structure. To me, the constitution and bylaws act as a blueprint for all that I do as President of OST. I must refer to them at least once every 2 weeks, if not more often. They address our purpose, membership, income and dues, the Temple officers and Board of Directors, the terms of clergy contracts, board and congregational meetings and quorums, the nomination process, committees, auxiliaries (Sisterhood, Men’s Club and youth groups), our trustees and more. Finally, we recently completed work on an organizational chart for the Temple which we will be publishing soon.

If you have any questions on our organizational structure, constitution/bylaws, budget, or any other matter with the Temple, please know that my door, phone, and email are always open.

The Arts Enrich Our Classrooms



Ohef Sholom Religious School is fortunate to have a Music Teacher and two Art Specialists who bring the enrichment of art and music to our classes on a regular basis.

Our very creative art teachers, Sara Bachman and Burgess Hodges, provide engaging art projects that are related to and enhance the curriculum of each grade. Art that is related to the topics students are learning strengthens the learning process and blends learning styles with curriculum - enabling opportunities for differentiated and enhanced learning for all our children and youth.

Our art program begins with our youngest students. Each project they do in art enriches and reinforces what they are learning about Jewish Holidays, Torah stories, Jewish symbols and *mitzvot*. Art

projects for older students are woven into their curriculum and deepen their understanding of what they are learning.

For example, in the sixth grade where students study Jewish life cycle events, they each created their own tallit or prayer shawl. Through this experience they learned that it is not the garment itself, whether beautiful and adorned or plain and simple, that makes the prayer shawl special. What transforms a piece of cloth into a *tallit* are the *tzitzit*, the fringes on its four corners that the Torah instructs us to wear as a way of remembering and doing all God's commandments. It wraps around us like a tent, creating a sense of personal space during prayer.

The fourth grade, while addressing what it means to be a Jew, made individual block prints interpreting their feelings about being Jewish. The individual prints were then combined to make one large print of their collective Jewish identity.

Students in the fifth grade created necklaces and keychains with maps

and beads to identify places where their families originated and will be working on creating beautiful family trees as they study their Jewish roots in class.

While studying the Torah portion about Joseph, seventh graders created magnificent "Coats of Many Colors." These currently adorn the walls on their classroom. Come in and see them! Ninth graders explored their personal understanding of and relationship with God through several creative projects including graffiti addressing the names of God and paintings exploring Creation. Visitors are always welcome to join us in our art rooms on Sunday mornings. You can even try out your own creativity!



Our very talented music specialist, Marilyn Johns, teaches music to all grades and leads songs in our weekly worship service and trains our new teen song leaders. Preschool through 3rd grade have music class every Sunday and grades 4 - 8 meet every other week. The students learn Jewish songs that they sing in Hebrew and in English. Each lesson reinforces our school's curriculum, the Jewish holidays and life cycles. Using rhythm instruments, movement and dancing are all a part of the fun they have.

New to our program this year are our teen song leaders, Ginger Johns, Channa Schachet-Briskin and Lucy Waldman. Marilyn Johns and Cantor Wally meet with them before Sunday school to learn "all that they need to know to lead Jewish song sessions," including learning new songs, reviewing old ones and fine tuning guitar skills. They have been a very welcome addition to the worship service that we have each Sunday! We've even included them in a few "camp style" Saturday morning services in the chapel. Music really gives the children an opportunity to express their Jewish "*ruach*!"

Visitors are always welcome to come into the chapel during music class and sing along or just enjoy listening to the students, and we are always delighted to have you join us for our Sunday Service at 11 a.m.

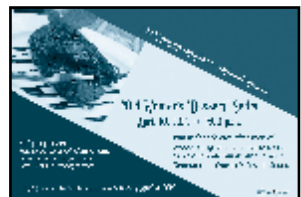

IT1 (Information Systems Technician) Brett Trussell, a sailor for 22 years and congregant at OST for seven years, is assigned to Assault Craft Unit Four. He started coming to the OST Soup Kitchen because of his mother-in-law, Judy Freedman, a long-time (and much appreciated!) volunteer at our Soup Kitchen. Brett recollects his first day at the Soup Kitchen, *"One Monday, I decided to go and see what it was all about. I was in uniform since I left work early to go. I really enjoy helping people, and this was a great way for me to do that. The first guest I met was a guy who asked me if we had any shoes for him (since we distribute clothes, shoes etc.) because his shoes had holes in them. We searched everywhere, even in the Temple lost and found, and eventually found a pair of shoes he could wear. As he took off his shoes to put the "new" ones on, I noticed he had holes in his socks. I couldn't see letting him put these new shoes on with holes in his socks, but we didn't have any more socks to give out. For almost 15 years, I have worn two pairs of socks with my uniform, one white pair and one black pair to prevent blisters. I took off my white socks and gave them to him. From that day forward, I have gone to the Soup Kitchen every month, and I make it a point to collect clothes and shoes from people at work. I put a box out and ask anyone to drop off what they don't need so I can bring it in for our guests. Since then, I have recruited other sailors to come and volunteer their time; it's great for the community and for their military service."*

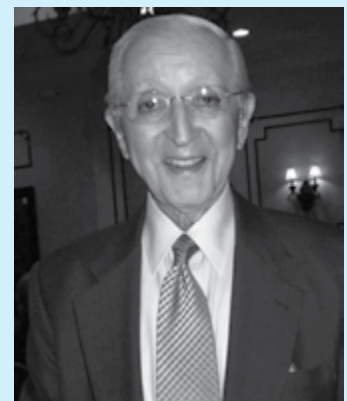
