Cantor's Notes

I remember receiving the gift of a music book of Chanukah songs in 1975, while my family was on our annual Thanksgiving Weekend trek to a Riverside Folk Song Society retreat. I love Chanukah songs, but it occurred to me that the Festival of Lights was supposed to be closer to the end of the secular year, so when we started lighting holiday candles at Camp O-ongo after eating turkey leftovers, it made me curious. As I grew, I discovered what most of us have come to observe: the Jewish holidays seem to slip and slide over about a 30-day period from year to year. What's responsible for such wild swings in timing? Should we blame it on Climate Change?

Not really -- it's a little more predictable than that. Rabbi Steinberg outlined in last month's OST bulletin how every few years, an extra month is thrown into the Jewish calendar, and every 19 years, the Jewish and Gregorian calendars re-align to within a couple of days.

It's neat that Chanukah and Thanksgiving are overlapping this year because the two are related, although it's through a "third party." Historians relate that when the Pilgrims in the New World wanted to throw a feast of giving thanks for the bountiful fall harvest, they found inspiration in the Bible, when the Israelites do just that during their Festival of Booths (Sukkot). Historical theorists also believe that when the Jewish Maccabees finally rescued the Second Temple in Jerusalem from the Greeks in 165 BCE and re-dedicated the holy space (in Hebrew, Chanukah means dedication), they wanted to celebrate - but how? Some say they looked to the most recent Festival for them, which happened to be Sukkot, and which had been skipped because of the Greek occupation of the Temple. That's an eight-day festival when combined with what evolved into the holiday of Simchat Torah. This also gives us one answer for why Chanukah lasts eight days. Two offshoots of Sukkot, on the same weekend every 19 years -- who knew?

We as an Ohef Sholom community have a couple of opportunities to celebrate festively at our Temple facility at this time of year. **On Friday, November 22 at 6:30 pm**, join us for our wonderful Chanukah Dinner. Bring a menorah, two candles, and your family for a delicious Shabbat meal. There will also be activities to occupy the youngest folks! It will be followed by a Chanukah-themed service at 7:30. **On Thursday, November 28 at 10:00 am**, enjoy some yummy morning snacks and treats before gathering for our annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Service at 11:00 am. As has been our custom for more than 80 years, Ohef Sholom Temple and Freemason Street Baptist Church will worship together in our chapel and show appreciation.

So, as you're giving thanks and lighting two Chanukah candles at your Turkey Day feast, enjoying the blessings for which we are so grateful, you might also thank those smart cookies who figured out how to line up the seasonal and lunar calendars ... and wonder if they ever took into account that in Australia, it's already transitioning from spring into summer, so the Festival of Lights is celebrated there when it's the brightest time of year!

P.S. If we celebrate Chanukah by frying food like latkes in oil to remind us of the oil that burned for eight days, why not try (safely) frying a turkey this year?

OST Starts the New Year with a Mitzvah

I talked about this at the Kol Nidre service, but I wanted to share it in this issue of the bulletin in case you were unable to attend. It is about a special mitzvah that Ohef Sholom Temple was a part of just 2 days before Yom Kippur. I received a call from Rabbi Goldstein of Gomley Chesed Synagogue in Portsmouth on Wednesday, September 11. He told me that the ceiling of Gomley Chesed's building had just caved in and they found asbestos in the area – thus the property was not habitable and could not be repaired by Yom Kippur. He asked about the possibility of his congregation using the Temple Sinai sanctuary for Yom Kippur services. As most of you know, when we merged with Temple Sinai, their land and buildings in Portsmouth became part of Ohef Sholom and they have been vacant and for sale for the past year and a half. After quickly consulting with the Executive Committee, it was with great pleasure that I told Rabbi Goldstein that “of course” they could use the property. Then our “Temple team” switched into high gear:

- Charlie Nusbaum made sure our insurance coverage was modified to allow Gomley Chesed's occupancy of Temple Sinai.
- Bill Nusbaum squeezed into a very busy day the writing of a legal document to lease the property to Gomley Chesed for the weekend, at no charge of course, but just to be sure everyone was covered legally.
- Peter Crockin met Rabbi Goldstein over at the property and gave him the keys late Wednesday night.
- Tom and David Bachman went over to the property Thursday morning to check on the power and water (and found the air conditioning not working, and that there was an electrical problem with the lighting).
- Peter Crockin subsequently met the HVAC and Electrical Contractors at Temple Sinai that afternoon so they could make the required repairs.
- Lisa Cohen and I took my truck over to Gomley Chesed Thursday morning and helped them load up and move their ark, torahs, reading table, tallitot, yarmulke holder, coffee pots, toilet paper, trash cans, and so forth over to Temple Sinai. We called ourselves *Two Women and a Truck*.
- Mike Phillips and Gill, our maintenance crew here at OST, went over to Temple Sinai that same day and installed light bulbs that were missing or burnt out, as well as extra smoke detectors.
- Rabbi Roz made a call to Rabbi Goldstein to make sure he was ok and see if he needed anything for Yom Kippur and Kol Nidre.
- Our Temple office helped serve as central command coordinating all efforts.

I felt so bad for Rabbi Goldstein and the congregants of Gomley Chesed, not being able to pray in their own temple for Yom Kippur, but at least they had a place to worship. And thank goodness, the ceiling had not caved in during their Rosh Hashanah services when their congregants were present.

I just want to say how proud I am to be part of Ohef Sholom Temple, especially during times like these – where we all come together to help people in need. Just like we come together for our monthly Soup Kitchen, Oasis, JCOC dinners, Backpack project, For Kids food project etc. that our wonderful Caring Committee, Sisterhood and Men's Club facilitate throughout the year. It truly does take a village ...

So, perhaps there is a reason we have not sold the property just yet – perhaps it needed to remain empty so that it would be there for Gomley Chesed during their crisis. And let's hope we have been inscribed to be able to sell it in the New Year.

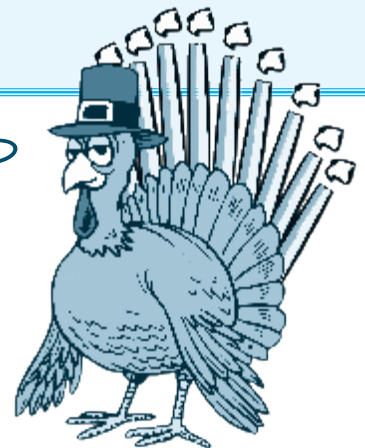
On that note, please keep your ears and eyes out for any potential buyers looking for a place for a church, synagogue, day care, or similar use.

Ohef Sholom, as a congregation that predates the Civil War, is part of that history. Most Jews living in Norfolk and the United States in the years preceding the Civil War came from Germany. This explains why our name Ohef Sholom is spelled using the German spelling of "Shalom." Unlike in Europe, Jews found themselves in a land where they were not required to live in separate sections of the city or be forced to wear distinctive clothing to mark them as different. Even with no restrictions our members do seem to still cluster in Ghent and by the beach. Don't get me started on distinctive clothing, but at least it's not forced on us. Even with anti-Semitism, our ancestors were treated on an equal footing with their fellow immigrants and were some of the first white settlers to arrive in the New World. During the Civil War, Jewish men fought in the armies of both the North and South, and the women and children they left behind raised money, tended the sick and wounded, and worked for the relief of widows and orphans on both sides.

Toxics: Many cleaning products contain chemicals that are bad for your health and the environment, and have not been adequately tested for their harmful effects. Clean safely by making your own green cleaners. Follow this simple recipe for an all-purpose cleaner:

- 4 cups warm water
- 2 tablespoons of vinegar or lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 tablespoons of natural liquid soap (such as Dr. Bronner's orange scented)
- 10 drops of essential oil (Lavender, Pine or Tea Tree)—optional, but helps disinfect and adds a good smell

Mix water, vinegar and baking soda first, then add the soap and essential oil.

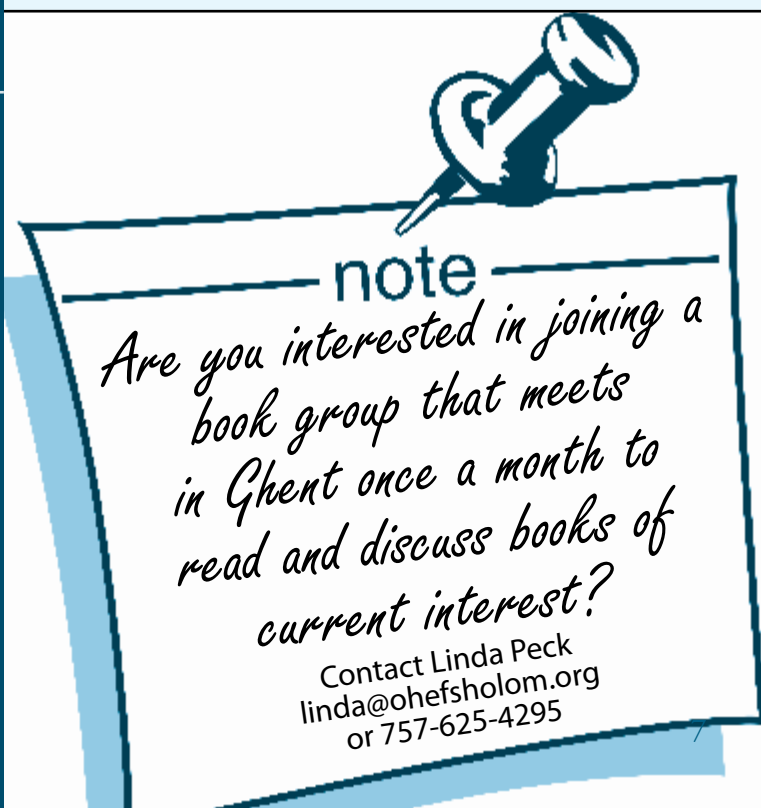
Is That Jewish!?!

THE CARING COMMITTEE

The Caring Committee is off to an exciting start. Over the summer, we recruited many new members with the help of the Rabbi. As a result, we had record attendance at our first meeting of the new year in August. We are thrilled to have a great group of "caring" members with new ideas, energy and enthusiasm. Having a larger committee will allow us to better serve the congregation and the community, and we are currently discussing new projects with which to get involved.

For the second year, we are very pleased to offer the "Feed A Child" program which supports the Foodbank of Virginia's Backpack Program. This program provides food to over 3,000 school children in 49 elementary schools in Hampton Roads. The schools estimate that there are 80,000 elementary students in need of food assistance.

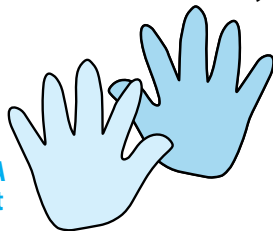
This year, our goal is to sponsor 25 elementary children from Chesterfield Academy Elementary School in Norfolk. Each selected child will receive a backpack full of non-perishable grocery items every other Friday during the school year to ensure that the child has something to eat over the weekend. The Foodbank provides the food items, we sort and pack the bags once a month, and then deliver them to the school for distribution.

New Religious School Program

This year we have added a new Hebrew component to the Religious School classes. Our Hebrew Specialist, Marnie Waldman, visits each class on a regular basis introducing the students to Hebrew words and phrases that are relevant to their classroom studies and interests. This program is largely based on the "Hebrew through Movement" program.

"Hebrew Through Movement" is a program where children learn Hebrew through first responding to basic action commands (stand, sit, jump and walk) and then engaging with various objects, relating to Jewish holidays and rituals. This version of Total Physical Response (TPR) introduces conversational Hebrew in a playful and meaningful way creating a positive link between children and Hebrew. "Hebrew Through Movement" is supported by the latest brain research on learning, providing an aural foundation for Hebrew that opens the door to more facile Hebrew decoding and reading. It uses many methods of teaching typically found in a language immersion program.

The program takes into account the ways that children learn naturally:

- By moving and doing
- Through songs, chants, and rhythmic activities
- By creating a positive environment where learning is joyful and playful

Children feel safe from the embarrassment of not knowing (since many commands are done as a group).

So far, in the Pre-K-9th grade classrooms, students have received lessons on Hebrew vocabulary relating to Rosh Hashanah, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. Props used in the classroom include apples, flags, ribbons of various colors, etrogs, stars, a miniature Torah and a crown. Through basic commands and movement, children have already learned several colors, commands and basic greetings. Most students from all grade levels have shown enthusiasm toward the program, and each classroom has gone at its own pace. The Pre-K -2nd grade classrooms are also using "Hebrew Through Movement" techniques to learn their Alef Bet.

"Hebrew Through Movement" has been featured in the latest addition of the Reform Judaism (URJ) Fall 2013 publication under Reimagine Hebrew Education.
