"Islamic Fundamentalism & the New Middle East"

Since the birth of Israel in 1948, the Arab-Israeli conflict has dominated the Middle East. Over the past several years, however, there has been a geo-political shift in the Middle East which has created a new reality on the ground. There is no longer an Arab-Israeli conflict, but rather a conflict between secular regimes and fundamentalist movements. In the recent round of fighting between Israel and Hamas, both Saudi Arabia and Egypt publicly backed Israel against fellow Arab Muslims. This has never been seen before. What does it mean for Israel? Who are the fundamentalists? What do they want? Where did they come from and what can be done? This talk will provide a history of these movements and discuss what options Israel and the US have for dealing with them.



Cantor's Notes

Why are you not doing more Mitzvot?

This is not intended to be a guilt-inducing question, nor one that is rhetorical. Seriously, what's stopping you from doing more good deeds? Maybe your answers include: "If I had more time, I'd have the flexibility in my schedule to perform acts of kindness." "If I were a more religious person, I'd do more good deeds first, but I have different priorities." "What's a Mitzvah?" I'll let you in on a fresh idea – actually, it's centuries old, but it's often ignored in today's hustle and bustle – if you take what you love to do, and

work with it to benefit others and make the world better, while understanding that you're acting on Jewish values, you're a Mitzvah-doer.

Here are but a few examples – perhaps these will inspire you. If you like baking, *ForKids* is perpetually in need of casseroles for their "Hot Meals and Homework" program that OST helps with... If cooking or even distributing donated goods are your bag, our monthly "Warm Hearts" Soup Kitchen are waiting for your talents... If you are crafty with fabric, and you're ready for your next project, there are no-sew fleece blankets to be made... If you love organizing, the OST Office may need help filing... If you love family activities, the OST Caring Committee's "Tikkun Olam Together - Multigenerational Mitzvah Projects" is happening multiple times this year – watch this space for more details... If you enjoy reading out loud, the JCC's "BEAR – Be A Reader" program helps at-risk children in Tidewater public schools acquire the reading skills and love of learning that lead to personal happiness and success. Even if you just shop at the grocery store every so often, buying an extra can of food each time specifically to donate to our ongoing food drive can help fulfill a Mitzvah, thereby making the world a little bit better. There are lots of ways to get involved in doing good within our Hampton Roads Jewish Community.

My dad succumbed to his long battle with Colon Cancer on October 6, 2014. One of the legacies he left with me and with his community was his spirit of giving generously. He served in the US Army and while stationed in Alaska he volunteered to entertain as a clarinet player in the Army Band. When he was working as an attorney in private practice, he volunteered at a free legal clinic two evenings a week. He was awarded the highest regional honor for service to Scouting, the Silver Beaver. He sponsored two chairs in the local symphony. And he volunteered for the most demanding job the Jewish community could ask: he served for many years on his Temple Board and took a two-year term as Temple President. My dad role-modeled using his wide range of skills to give back to his country, his city, and his Jewish community.

Most of you know that I enjoy volunteering at Jewish summer camp. Our Temple graciously grants me two weeks to be at a camp where our congregants attend, and I take two weeks of my vacation time to match it. One of the activities I engage the teens in during my stay is "Songs of Love." This project takes my passions for Jewish education, Jewish values, Mitzvah-doing, camp experiences, songwriting, and caring for others, and utilizes all of them for doing good. The *Songs of Love Foundation* matches terminally or chronically ill children with songwriters, who then compose, record and send a professional-quality personalized song through the organization to the children. Tammy and I ask for a group of high school volunteers at the camp. We then study Jewish values, Maimonides' levels of giving *Tzedakah*, and a profile the family or social worker has sent to the *Songs of Love Foundation*. The chance to work as a group to apply our talents, skills, and Jewish values, in a camp setting, really resonates with me and with the students we work with. Tammy and I have been presenting this project to teenage volunteers for close to 15 years, and for the first time this summer we received a profile of a child which was labeled "RUSH" – the six-year-old patient was in hospice. We were unsure if we, or the teens at URJ Kutz Camp, could handle the emotional weight of the project. After deep conversations with clergy colleagues and with the teenagers about the Jewish values of comforting the ill, giving without receiving, and accompanying the dying, we decided to accept the challenge. A beautiful song for Christopher Bowen was written, performed, recorded, and returned to the Foundation within a week. It was an important and moving Mitzvah – one that everyone involved in the project will remember for a long time. We also found out that one of our teenage project participants from last year at Camp Airy started a *Songs of Love* club at his high school, and is continuing to work with the Foundation, writing songs for young patients. In addition to doing direct good, he is continuing the act of role-modeling for others, which is one of the great benefits of Mitzvah-doing – it spreads.

Jewish summer camp is quite an inspiring place for children and young adults to learn about Mitzvah-doing. If you want to encourage our camper-aged students to go, Jewish summer camp makes a great Chanukah gift for your child, grandchild, or favorite young relative or friend! We have scheduled a Camp-style Shabbat and Camp Open House in mid-January. Please watch for more details, and plan to attend.

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT



I wanted to share my thoughts on my favorite Bible story and how it relates to me and my family, as well as to Ohef Sholom Temple, as I shared on Rosh Hashanah morning. I think we all have one Bible story that really resonates and relates to our “real lives.” For me, it is the story of Ruth. I love the loyalty and love that Ruth has for her mother-in-law. I love and admire her statement which includes *“For wherever you go, I will go.”*

But what I also love and relate to is that the story of Ruth is a story of “interfaith” relationships. Ruth was not Jewish; she was a Moabite. She married Naomi’s son, a Jew, who subsequently died. Ruth’s mother-in-law, Naomi, then suggests that Ruth go back to “her people.” Ruth responds with:

“For wherever you go, I will go. Wherever you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die, and there will I be buried. Thus and more may God do to me if anything but death parts me from you.”

I come from an interfaith family. My father was Jewish by birth, my mother was not, having been raised Christian. She converted to Judaism after marrying my father and both she and my Dad raised me and my two brothers in the Jewish faith. My husband is not Jewish, but as everyone knows he supports me in my faith - and was the one schlepping the kids to Religious School on Sundays because I was working. My daughter-in-law and son-in-law, spouses of my children, are not Jewish. My two sister in-laws were not Jewish when they married my brothers; one has since converted to Judaism and is raising my nephews as Jews here at OST. But, despite our diversity, we all gather together on the Jewish holidays. We respect each other and celebrate our differences.

That is what the story of Ruth is to me – and what I love about Ohef Sholom and Reform Judaism – Acceptance and Inclusivity. Our congregation is a “melting pot,” which includes over 50% of our congregation being part of an interfaith family, and many coming from different backgrounds. As the words on our doorposts read, we are “a house of prayer for all peoples.” For Jews, Non-Jews, Straight, Gay, Single, Married, Black, White, East and West coast people, Southerners, Northerners, those with special needs and disabilities....I could go on and on. So in this New Year 5775, I ask you to think about what Ohef Sholom Temple means to you, and to reach out to your family, your friends, our community. To invite them to Ohef Sholom Temple for a program, a service, a celebration, a Holiday. To show them what we are all about. To demonstrate our inclusivity and our celebration of everyone. To let them know, that *“whither they go, we are there too.”*

The Special Needs and Security Committee has spent the last number of months helping to improve and prepare the OST facilities for the new Religious School year and security for the High Holidays.

The Religious School under the leadership of Kitty Wolf, Committee Members and dedicated Staff have all helped to design and implement a number of security improvements and protocols. 
Join OST's Walking Group on October 16 for a walk in First Landing State Park.


The permanent B'nai Mitzvah display is on the third floor. For those of you who have yet to find a project, check out the ideas and places we have posted.

Both the September OST Soup Kitchen and the meal prepared and served at the Judeo Christian Outreach Center (JCOC) in Virginia Beach hosted record numbers of people – 107 and 135 respectively. **Thank you to the excellent Temple volunteers who gave of their energy, skills, and time to do deeds of loving kindness!**

It was clear during our last Soup Kitchen that our homeless brothers and sisters are looking ahead to cold weather and trying to prepare. How to Become a “Pillar of the Temple”

By now you may have heard of Ohef Sholom’s new “**Pillars of the Temple**” program, but are wondering what it is and how it applies to you. Simply stated, it is a *voluntary level of annual giving* above the single or family membership that is **inclusive** of your temple dues, building and security fees. Depending on which of the 6 *Pillar* levels you choose, your *Pillar* Commitment also includes membership to Men’s Club and Sisterhood; admission for 2 to Shabbat Dinners, Chanukah Dinner, Passover Seder, Break the Fast, and Kaufmann Award Brunch; plus a Recognition Dinner and Shabbat Service for all “**Pillars of the Temple**” planned for spring 2015.


With the goal of making Ohef Sholom Temple more financially stable and less dependent on fundraisers to balance the budget, the Dues Committee created the “**Pillars of the Temple**” program, which was then approved by the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors of Ohef Sholom Temple. We are very excited that as of the date I am writing this article, we have raised \$20,000 in increased annual dues from our *Pillars*. This is half of the \$40,000 required of our annual fundraiser by our budget. It is our hope to be able to make the goal of \$40,000 by the end of the fiscal year.

We realize that not everyone is able to increase their dues to a *Pillar* level, and welcome any increase in your membership commitment, and of course value your volunteer commitment as well. Another exciting change in our dues structure, now called Covenant of Membership, is the creation of the under 30 Complimentary OST membership. All Jewish adults under the age of 30 are eligible for a free membership at Ohef Sholom Temple. If the under 30 individual chooses to pay \$500 or more in membership commitment, they will become a “**Pillar of the Temple**” at the **Young Lions Level**.

In the coming months, the Dues Committee will be reaching out to the congregation to ask if you would like to be recognized as a “**Pillar of the Temple**.” In addition, we want to be sure that congregants who are already contributing at a *Pillar* level are aware of the benefits you will receive, and give you the appropriate recognition. We want to thank you for your generosity, which allows Ohef Sholom Temple to continue to be the most vibrant congregation in Tidewater, boasting amazing Clergy and Staff, an unparalleled Music Program and Religious School, and offering boundless activities, programs and *Tikkun Olam* projects. Finally, probably the most important benefit our *Pillars* provide for OST is that they enable us to continue to fulfill our mission by being a “House of Prayer for all Peoples,” regardless of financial ability.

We are aware that some may choose to become a *Pillar* yet want to remain anonymous and we will of course honor that request.
