A Word from the Rabbi

Standing with Israel in the New Year

On July 24, 2014, nearly 600 members of our Tidewater Jewish Community stood together with Israel at the JCC. The following are the remarks I made at the opening of the program in my capacity as President of the Board of Rabbis and Cantors of Hampton Roads. I share these words with you because nearly a full month later, not much has changed. If anything, the situation has worsened, for with the onslaught of missiles has come a war of another kind, equally as dangerous -- a latent anti-Semitism,

which many of us thought dead, has reared its ugly head across Europe, Asia, America and, of course, the Middle East. With the High Holidays one month away we cannot waver in our support for our Jewish homeland or our brothers and sisters throughout the world, nor can we ease off on our fervent prayers for peace. So until we stand together again, on the eve of the New Year, *Rosh Hashanah*, I leave you with the words I spoke that night:

My Dear Fellow Lovers of Zion,

We come together this night to stand with Israel, to express with our bodies what our hearts and minds feel so deeply -- that Israel has a right to exist; that she has a moral obligation to defend herself and her citizens; and, like every people on earth, that Israel is entitled to live in peace.

Yet even as we gather here, proud and strong in our belief that she will prevail, we worry about the safety and well-being of our brothers and sisters in Zion; about the brave and imperiled young men and women in the IDF; about the innocent lives taken and those yet to die; about a world gone mad with virulent anti-Semitism, violence against Jews and the vilification of Israel as evil.

Well we know this is a war of Hamas' making, calculated to force Israel to kill their missile-shielding children, which, in perverse irony, breaks our hearts more than it does theirs. Yet even as we know our cause is necessary and just, we mourn the men, women and children whose lives have been lost on both sides of the great and terrible divide: the students, the IDF soldiers, the men, women and children all of whom are victims of Hamas' terror.

So much has been written, so much said. And so much is still unknown. But there are some things we do know with certainty:

Israel is bolstered by her partnership with the United States; thank God for our funding of her Iron Dome technology; thank God for our leaders' unilateral condemnation of Hamas' terrorism; thank God for our standing shoulder to shoulder with her, as we do tonight, and in cities like ours, all over this country and throughout the world.

Another thing we know with certainty is that Israel will survive: she is mighty and strong; her people are resilient in mind, body and spirit; and life in our Jewish homeland goes on. Am Yisrael Chai, the people of Israel lives, determined not to allow terror to undo their way of life. Israel is and will always be a lawful, orderly, free and democratic society; committed to the betterment of our world, the love of justice, and the pursuit of peace.

We are here tonight, in the words of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, "to pray with our feet"; to stand with the defenders of Israel; to be comforted of our fear and pain and anger; and, no matter how futile it seems, to dare together to hope for peace. So we follow the example of the Psalmist (122) who wrote:

*Pray for the well-being of Jerusalem;
May those who love you be at peace.
May there be well-being within your ramparts,
peace in your citadels.
For the sake of my kin and friends,
I pray for your well-being;
For the sake of the house of Adonai, our God,
I seek your good. Amen.*

May the New Year bring peace to us, to Israel and to all the world,

THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL RELIEF FUND

What is it? What purpose does it serve? How can YOU help?

Last year our Religious School Committee engaged in a strategic planning process from which the following Mission Statement was created:

Ohef Sholom Religious School is committed to raising Reform Jews whose identity is firmly grounded in Torah and Jewish texts, and connected to our history, culture, language, and traditions, as well as to the state of Israel.

We believe strongly that this opportunity should be available to each and every one of our children. The Religious School Relief Fund was created by OST's leadership to support this belief. Its main purpose is to provide "scholarship" monies to Religious School families in order to ensure that all the children of OST receive the best Jewish learning experience possible.

Scholarships to Religious School students are partially funded by the Stern and Kesser Funds, which distribute 4.25% of the principal to scholarships, totaling about \$800 each year. Yet, in the past few years, scholarship requests have increased considerably, due in large part to challenging economic times. Over the past 3 years the amount of scholarship-requests has averaged around \$4,500 per year. Where does the rest of the money come from?

The remaining funds for scholarships are provided by the **Religious School Relief Fund**. Without a dedicated source of funding, the Relief Fund relies on contributions from fundraising efforts and direct donations. While the Relief Fund has been able to meet the demand for increased scholarship monies over the past few years, the Fund is always in need of replenishment ... in other words, donations.

With the new school year approaching quickly, economic recovery continuing to be slow, and the reality of unexpected financial difficulties facing any of us, the Religious School Relief Fund is essential. Providing tuition assistance to Religious School families ensures that we can follow through on our commitment to provide a quality Jewish learning experience to all who seek it.

How can you help? The biggest way we all can help is through direct donations to the **Religious School Relief Fund**. So when thinking of a way to honor a family member, teacher or friend ... or when celebrating a holiday, birthday, Bar or Bat Mitzvah or other lifecycle event, consider making a gift to the Religious School Relief Fund, a gift of Jewish learning!

Community Outreach

Tikkun Olam Together: Multigenerational mitzvah projects scheduled throughout the year so Temple members of all ages can make a community impact together.

Soup Kitchen: Serves our homeless neighbors a full hot meal and distributes toiletries, clothing, backpacks, and other necessities on the last Monday of the month at OST from 9:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

NEST: Provides meals and a place to sleep overnight for a week to homeless adults during the winter at our Temple or Church partner.

Chesterfield Academy Elementary School: Chesterfield is a Math and Science magnet school near OST in the Norfolk Public School system. 87% of their students are on free or reduced-cost lunches, which is an indicator of significant poverty. OST has become Chesterfield's "faith-based community partner" by packing and supplying bi-weekly food backpacks for students so they can eat on the weekends, and by being a caring organization the school can call upon when their students need volunteers for extra programming or important resources.

Temple In-Reach

Chaver l'chaver/Member to member: Volunteers call or visit fellow Temple members to provide compassion, companionship, and community in times of illness, bereavement, or other life struggles, with the goal being to help facilitate healing and wholeness.

Caring Casseroles: Casseroles are prepared at OST and delivered by congregants to other congregants to make life easier during illness, recovery, births, and bereavement.

Cards: Volunteers write thoughtful cards of condolence, caring, or congratulations to congregants in times of a death, healing, or celebration.

Behind the Scenes at OST

Meet Mike Phillips

Fortunately for OST, Mike Phillips happened to be working in a local Taylor Do-It Center one day in 2005 when Tom Bachman walked in. Tom recruited Mike to come over to help with maintenance at Ohef Sholom Temple, and Mike has been an important part of our Temple ever since.

Raised in Clinton, NY, as the middle of five children, Mike has always thought of himself as a jack-of-all trades. With a Bachelor's degree in Hospitality Management from Lynn University in Boca Raton, he's worked facilities management at Marriot and held all kinds of jobs at a private farm in Rindge, NH. Whether he was maintaining a fleet of farm vehicles or walking the humongous (and intimidating) Clydesdale horses, Mike has never met a challenge he wouldn't tackle.

"I feel so fortunate. I've got a good job, health insurance, and a home, and I see a lot of people who are not so fortunate. I don't have a lot but what I have I'll certainly give somebody."



Mike loves being the caretaker of this beautiful, historic building. No two days are ever the same. The most demanding part of the job for him is working for 750 families where everyone is his boss. But he thrives at wearing many hats. He says that roof leaks are his biggest challenge, and he loves "preparing for the worst" by making sure we are ready to face any storm.

What you might not know about Mike is his beautiful heart. He feels very lucky. "I get paid to do Mitzvahs," he notes as he frequently hauls goods for the Soup Kitchen or the Food Bank, helps with our fundraisers, etc.

While working at the Soup Kitchen a couple of years back, he learned that a homeless guest needed a pair of size 11 shoes. Without batting an eye, Mike turned over a pair of shoes explaining, "I feel so fortunate. I've got a good job, health insurance, and a home, and I see a lot of people who are not so fortunate. I don't have a lot but what I have I'll certainly give somebody."

Mike also plays an integral role in keeping us safe. Every day he walks the premises, inside and out and, as a member of our Special Needs and Security Committee, he helps implement many of their ideas. Once his life was even threatened when he politely asked a loiterer outside the sanctuary to move. He also works on Sundays, the Temple's busiest day of the week, when he enjoys interacting with our families and children.

Basically, Mike will do anything to keep our Temple safe and efficient. He explains, "I think the Temple does a lot for the community, and I'm proud to be a part of that."

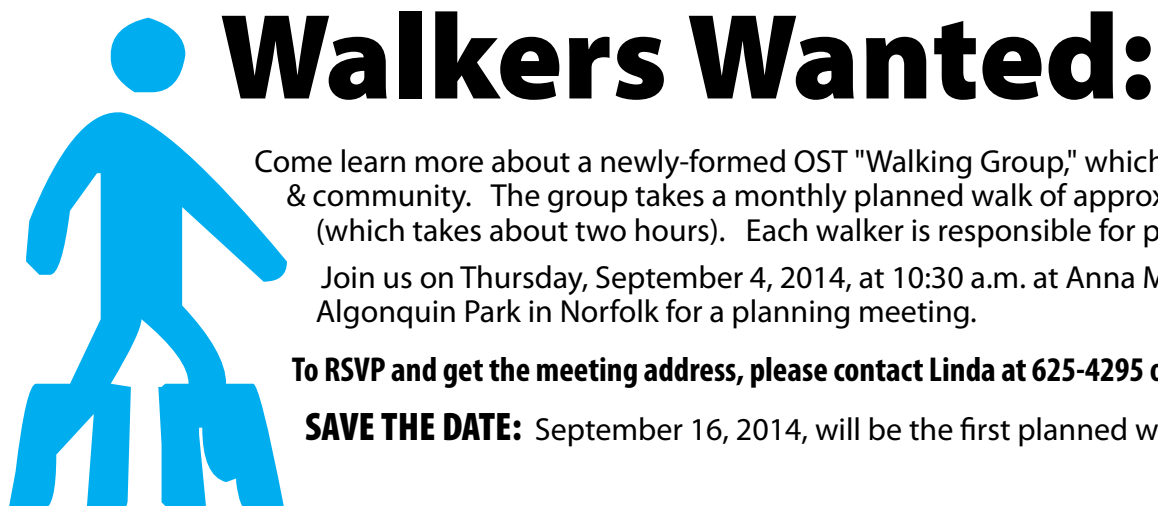
