CLERGY CORNER

A Word from the Rabbi

At this moment, as you are reading this bulletin article, it is very likely that *Rosh Hashanah* is only a few days away and *Yom Kippur* just beyond it. I struggle mightily each year to bring you messages that will help inspire you to transform your relationships, your lives and our world for the better in the coming New Year. The older I get, the clearer it becomes, that the only wisdom that I can offer for any growth and change has to begin with you. The old adage that you get out of life what you put into it is, after all, the theme of *Rosh Hashanah*. On the birthday of the world, each of us has the capacity

to be reborn; to make more of our life than we have as of yet; to find our purpose and reach our potential; to achieve fulfillment, joy and peace.

Our tradition even offers us a program for this spiritual makeover known as *Teshuvah* or repentance. Rabbi Moses ben Maimon, Maimonides or the Rambam, writing in the 11th century in France, has given us four simple steps to do *Teshuvah*, repentance:

- 1. You must admit you have done something wrong.
- 2. You must feel genuine remorse for having done it.
- 3. You must do something to make recompense for it. If you did it to another person, you must apologize, pay them back somehow with interest do something to try to make it better.
- 4. And you must resolve that you will never, ever do it again.

And how do you know if you've successfully completed the process? You are presented with the opportunity to commit a similar wrongdoing and you resist!

But there are wrongdoings that most of us are far more guilty of than hurting others and for which repentance or atonement is perhaps often even more difficult and these are the sins we commit against ourselves. We failed to take care of ourselves; we berated ourselves mercilessly for a mistake we made; we blamed ourselves for things that were not in our control; we accepted someone else's negative opinion of us as truth; we refused to see the good that we did.

So for this New Year, I propose an additional process of *Teshuvah*, an atonement of personal transformation, that I hope will help you to achieve at-one-ment.

- 1. You must consider all of the things you have done well and right.
- 2. You must feel genuine pride and joy in having done them.
- 3. You must do something to reward yourself for the good you did apologizing to yourself, sincerely, and compensating yourself with a healthy, non-material reward that makes you feel better.
- 4. And you must resolve to strive to acknowledge your strengths, positive behaviors and good deeds always.

And how will you know if you've successfully completed the process? The next time that critical voice starts playing the familiar "I'm no good" tape, you simply turn it off.

May the New Year bring each of you healthier relationships, greater fulfillment in your work and play, a sense of purpose that inspires you to bring healing to our community and world, and a real knowing that God created you wholly holy, imperfections and all!

Shana Tova u'Metukah! Marty and I wish you and those you love a sweet, happy, healthy and meaningful New Year.

An update on the latest happenings at OST and within the Jewish Community:

- We are in the process of re-energizing the "special needs" committee of the temple and will be scheduling a meeting in the coming months. In addition, we added the handicapped accessible automatic door openers to the parking lot entrance. (Please note that you just need to pull slightly on the door and then it will automatically open if you try and pull more it will seem extra heavy). Thanks to Jack and Beverly Fox for their generous donation to make these two devices possible.
- Our "Caring Committee" is getting organized for the year and needs your help with the many areas of the Temple they support: Soup Kitchen, JCOC, Nest, Oasis, Mitzvah Day, Meals and Rides Program, bereavement and congratulation cards and much more. Dorianne Villani and Ingeresa Friedman will be chairing the committee this year and would welcome some new faces.
- Finally there are many committees whose hard work makes our Temple thrive. Please consider joining at least one, if not two or three committees. It is a great way to meet new friends as well as to help support the work of Ohef Sholom Temple. A list of Temple committees is located on page 14 of the bulletin.

FROM THE ADULT ED COMMITTEE

Shalom,

I can't believe the Holidays are so early! Do you know why the holidays are so early?

The Jewish calendar is based on the revolution of the moon about the Earth (a month); and the revolution of the Earth about the sun (a year). On average, the moon revolves around the Earth in about 29½ days. The Earth revolves around the sun in about 365¼ days, that is about 12.4 lunar months. So a 12-month lunar calendar is about 11 days shorter than a solar year and a13-month lunar year is about 19 days longer than a solar year.

To compensate for this drift, the Jewish calendar uses a 12-month lunar calendar with an extra month occasionally added. Thus the holidays occur 11 days earlier each year for two or three years, and then jump forward 30 days, balancing out the drift.

In the fourth century, Hillel II established a fixed calendar based on mathematical and astronomical calculations. This calendar, still in use, standardized the length of months and the addition of months over the course of a 19-year cycle, so that the lunar calendar realigns with the solar years. Adar I is added in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th and 19th years of the cycle. Thus, the way the math works, this is as early as the holidays can be.

Extracurricular Youth Activities

This past year alone OST hosted 200+ Jewish youths at the NFTY Fall Kallah, including 28 of our own. In February, 6 OSTY members attended the NFTY National Convention in Los Angeles. In March, 22 OSTY members attended TheVent, another regional event in Washington, DC. And this summer, over 10 attended Jewish day and overnight camps such as Kutz Camp, JCC day camp, Camp Harlam, Camp Louise, and Camp Airy.

All of these highlight the strong impact that "Extracurricular Youth Activities," our children and teens engage in outside of our temple walls, have on their Jewish identity and, ultimately, their desire to continue their journey as lifelong Jews. Opportunities like these are what create the memories and foundation of how we identify ourselves as Jews. In the words of Cantor Wally, "Through experiences such as summer camp, youth group activities, and educational synagogue opportunities, we feel Jewish by connecting to other Jews." The URJ has recently launched The Campaign For Youth Engagement, the goal being to develop opportunities to ensure the majority of youth and their families remain engaged in Jewish life from the time they enter our communities through the rest of their lives.

One of the primary goals of our Religious School is to create lifelong Jewish learners; experiences like summer camp and NFTY events help to do this. Towards that end, the Extracurricular Youth Activities Fund was developed to help offset the costs of such activities. Though the name can be a bit misleading, as there is no specific "Fund" with monies set aside specifically to draw from, it is a vehicle that the Religious School committee has developed to help "find" the monies from other temple resources such as the Men's Club, Sisterhood, Discretionary Funds and other temple funds managed by the Temple Foundation Board. It is the belief of the Committee that by supporting activities like summer camp, (both day and overnight, local and out-of-town), NFTY events, and other "extra" experiences, our youth will more fully identify with their Judaism, enhance their connections to Jewish life and, hopefully, help create the community leaders we will need to move us into the future.

Registration for the upcoming Fall NFTY events has already started. As a committee, school, and Temple community, we should support our youth engaging in these "extracurricular opportunities" as much as possible. To that end, we are committed to helping "find" the monies necessary so that more of our children can benefit from them. Though there is not a "pot of gold" when it comes to scholarship money, we do have some funds and resources, at least, to help offset some of the costs associated with these types of programs.

THE CARING COMMITTEE

After chairing the Caring Committee for the past two years, I realize now, more than ever, how important the work of the Caring Committee is to the Temple as well as our community. We are a small group of Temple volunteers dedicated to helping those in need. Whether it is members of our congregation struggling with illness or loss or people in the larger Tidewater community who are homeless or hungry, we strive to ease their burden through our various outreach efforts and programs.

Our ongoing projects include the OST Soup Kitchen, run by Dorianne Villani, now in its third year, JCOC dinners, organized by Dorianne Villani and Anne Kramer, and NEST, organized by Sharon Ross. This year we added two new outreach programs, the Oasis Breakfast Project (formerly a Temple Sinai project) led by Marti Wachtel, that serves a monthly breakfast to the homeless at the Portsmouth Oasis Social Ministry, and the Foodbank Backpack project that provides non-perishable food items to elementary school children twice a month. We also organize the Annual Congregational Mitzvah Day. This small committee has a big heart and is able to touch many people in need thanks to the dedication and commitment of these project leaders. Thank you for all you do!

I know that we have made a difference to those we have served in this community, but I feel that a congregation of our size can and should do even more. My goal is to expand our committee and volunteer corps with people who want to serve the congregation and the community. This summer I have been recruiting new members with the help of Rabbi Roz and Linda Fox-Jarvis by personally inviting members whom we think may be interested. We want to expand our reach in the community and we need your help with planning, organizing and running our on-going projects as well as finding new worthwhile projects.

With the encouragement of Rabbi Roz, Linda Fox-Jarvis and the Caring Committee, I have agreed to continue a leadership role for one more year with the help of Dorianne Villani. Dorianne, who is already active running the OST Soup Kitchen and organizing the JCOC dinners, has graciously agreed to chair the Caring Committee with me. We will work together as Co-Chairs to grow the committee and its involvement in the temple and the community.

Many of our volunteers are OST congregants; others are non-member friends of congregants, sailors from several commands, even strangers who contact me after seeing our info on the website. Everyone brings his own personal strengths and reasons for being involved in our Soup Kitchen. In addition to this invaluable group of hands-on folks, there are always people behind the scenes who are so vital to our success: Soup Kitchen monthly sponsors, other generous donors of money or in-kind items, and of course our own OST clergy, administrative and maintenance staff (did you know the Cantor is very good at dicing onions?!).

This past month, Sara Bachman quietly made a big impact on our Soup Kitchen meal. Sara came to the rescue of a little four year-old boy, our first young patron. After speaking to his parents about how we could further assist them, his Mom told me his 5th birthday was the next week. So

I turned to the miracle makers in our OST office and asked if they could come up with something we could give this homeless boy for his birthday. Sara gathered together an OST bag, her own teddy bear, a package of markers and a coloring book that she quickly made on her computer. Smiles erupted all around from his family, as well as the volunteers! As Cantor said during his blessing with our volunteers before the meal was served, *"Baruch Ata, Adonai, Eloheinu, Melech Ha-Olam, she-natan lanu hizdamnut l'takein et ha-olam.* Blessed are You, Adonai, our God, Ruler of the Universe, who gives us the opportunity to repair the world."

Please get involved in this OST community outreach program. OASIS BREAKFAST

This past June marks the end of the first year that OST has sponsored breakfast for the homeless at Oasis Social Ministry in Portsmouth. A social action project of Temple Sinai for over 20 years, Oasis provides breakfast for the homeless, prepared and served by volunteers from religious congregations seven days a week. The OST Caring Committee volunteers for this breakfast on the second Sunday of each month from 7-9 a.m.

Beginning at 7 a.m., breakfast is prepared for serving at 8 a.m. The meal has been comprised of o.j. cereal, boiled eggs, toast and coffee. However, other options may be prepared. As Oasis has a secured kitchen, clean-up must be provided by the volunteers with everyone leaving no later than 9. Oasis is located at 800 Williamsburg Avenue off County Street near Downtown Portsmouth. The facility, which only opened two years ago, offers a well-appointed commercial kitchen and dining room. The location is easily accessible via the Midtown Tunnel or Interstate 264. The program currently feeds up to 100 homeless men and women.

When the program was at Sinai, it was funded by a special and independent Social Action Fund. However, at OST funding has to be developed. It is currently funded in part by the Caring Committee and the remainder by the Temple. The goal however is to become self-sufficient. To that end, serious efforts are underway to elicit sponsorships from members and groups of the Congregation. To date, sponsorships have included OST Sisterhood, Sharon and Gene Ross (in honor of Lou Sherman winning the Kaufman Award), Joash and Elaine (in memory of Joash's grandmother, Beverly Shulman) and Anne Kramer (in honor of Ed's service to the Temple). The cost of sponsorship is \$150 per meal. All congregants are urged to consider sponsoring this worthwhile program.

Volunteer opportunities abound for adults/ families to volunteer in meal preparation and serving. An Oasis basket in the OST lobby receives donations of non-perishable food items and paper goods. Often, other items are donated for sale at Oasis' Thrift Shop. Collections of toiletries, clothing, bedding and other items could be a great Mitzvah project for an upcoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah or Religious School class.



Adult Education Committee offers congregants and members of the public the opportunity to further their Jewish educations. Committee members use their connections and knowledge to benefit our Temple family and the community.

Archives/Library Committee plans and presents exhibits, displays, speakers and lectures on various Jewish and historical topics. This Committee operates Temple libraries for adults and children.

Budget/Finance Committee prepares the annual budget, monitors expenses throughout the year, and makes budget and related financial recommendations to the Board.

Caring Committee plans Meals of Consolation, coordinates the Annual Mitzvah Day, co-hosts NEST, cooks and serves meals at JCOC, visits Beth Sholom Home & Terrace, runs our monthly soup kitchen, OASIS breakfasts, and sends notes of condolence and congratulations to congregants.

Dues Committee sets policy for dues and dues adjustments.

Executive Committee acts for the Congregation between meetings of the Board of Directors.

Fine Arts Committee guides decoration of the Temple's interior décor, including selection and installation of artwork and furnishings.

Foundation Committee helps ensure the Temple's long-term financial viability by maintaining an endowment fund to help the Temple meet needs outside the annual operating budget.

Fundraiser Committee plans and implements a variety of fundraisers at the Temple.

Green Committee establishes procedures and guidelines to help lessen the Temple's negative impact on the world.

House (Building) Committee oversees the maintenance and repair of the Temple building and grounds. It recommends solutions to maintenance and mechanical systems problems to the Board of Directors, and proposes repairs and replacement projects as needed.

Interfaith/Outreach Committee develops programming to serve interfaith couples (regardless of Temple membership) and unaffiliated persons to serve their unique needs, with a related goal of encouraging the unaffiliated to join Ohef Sholom.

Investment Committee manages the Temple's investment portfolio and allocates assets appropriately among investment vehicles pursuant to the Temple's investment policy.

Long-Range Planning Committee gathers each Committee's budget and five-year plan to develop a new blueprint of Ohef Sholom's long-range plans.

Membership Committee organizes programming and procedures to attract new members and helps direct current and new members to relevant programs within the Temple.

Military Support and Outreach Committee addresses the needs of our active duty and retired military personnel both in the Temple and in the greater community.

Music Committee works in conjunction with the Rabbi, Cantor and Music Director to maintain the high quality of music for Ohef Sholom at all services (including the High Holy Days). This Committee also develops and hosts special Music Programs.

Personnel Committee reviews, evaluates, and proposes personnel policies and procedures. This Committee reviews the Temple's benefit plans and works with the Administrator on Human Resource matters.

Religious School Committee works closely with the clergy and Educator to oversee curriculum development, educational resources, and programming for both Hebrew and Religious Schools, our OSTY youth group, and Kids & Kiddush. It encourages members, current and new, to enroll their children in our Religious School.

Scholarship Committee administers Temple Scholarships for college students.

Special Needs Committee looks out for congregants with various disabilities. This committee helped attain Braille prayerbooks, an electric lift to assist the wheelchair bound to our bima and stage, and and automatic door opener for the front door.

Worship Committee responds to the worship needs of congregants by continuing to work with the clergy to develop creative, meaningful religious and spiritual Sabbath and holiday services.

SOCIAL GROUPS

Mavens & Mensches is a community of congregants, age 65 and up, who gather for social, cultural, educational, and religious events throughout the area.

Prime Time provides a social venue for members in the 45 to 60 year old age group. Once a month after, Friday night services, the Prime Time group gathers at a local restaurant for dinner, In addition the group plans social and educational activities.

Young Adult Community or YAC coordinates interesting and fun social and educational events for a vibrant group of 25ish to 45ish year olds, both single and married. Through creative programming, YAC aims to develop a community of people who will bond throughout their time as members of Ohef Sholom.

AUXILIARIES

Men's Club provides a venue for adult male congregants to gather and share in the spirit of camaraderie as well as to provide service and support to the Temple and its members. Men's Club participation can be financial, emotional, moral or even sweat labor.

Sisterhood brings women of Ohef Sholom together for social, educational, and spiritual gathering. Sisterhood sponsors Oneg Shabbats, an annual Chanukah dinner, lectures and study sessions with the Rabbi, a women's seder, and Shabbaton retreat. In addition it runs the Judaica Shop, which offers the finest collection of Judaica and items for a Jewish home.
