FROM THE CLERGY

Now is the time for Turning

Kohelet, or Ecclesiastes, reminds us, "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven," which The Byrds used as the text for their hit, "Turn, Turn, Turn." Indeed, crazy as it seems, as you read this Temple pOST, the summer has passed and with it lazy days spent relaxing, reading, vacationing, and, for our children and grandchildren, camping. Yet as much as we all enjoy the somewhat slower pace and precious time with family and friends that come with the summer months, some of us have always looked forward to the opportunities the fall brings. As long as we can remember, we anticipated the new school year, shopping for fresh school supplies and an outfit or two for the first days back, looking forward to meeting our teachers and exploring what we would be studying, getting back to the group activities we loved that for us always included singing in a school choir.

Many of us enjoy structure and learning and, as much as we might resist change, hopefully we have learned to appreciate how important it is to our growth over the course of time. We need punctuation marks in the routines of our lives to help us appreciate our blessings: moments to check in with ourselves about where we are and where we might need to change course, and experiences that open our minds, hearts, and spirits to new possibilities. If summer is our time to appreciate the outdoors, fall is definitely the season to look inward and anticipate with joy, if not a little trepidation, what the future might hold.

So the Jewish New Year, whose preparation begins during the month of Elul (September 4th), the month preceding the High Holidays, is the perfect time to do just that. Elul (often seen as an acronym for Ani l'Dodi v'Dodi li, I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine) refers to the process of drawing nearer to God, our beloved. We engage in a process of Teshuvah, repentance, seeking to return or reclaim our best selves. Taking an accounting of our souls we reflect: where am I proud of my behavior and where might I have fallen short? To whom might I owe an apology for my words or deeds? Where might I be able to

forgive one who has sincerely regretted their hurtful actions? How can I be a better partner, parent, or friend? A more patient and kind human being? A more fully contributing member of our community? Once again, during Yom Kippur afternoon, you will have the opportunity to come before the open ark with your family and offer personal prayers for all that you hope and dream your lives and our world can be.

We of Ohel Sholom are here to help you in every way we can. With beautiful services, meaningful study, symbolic rituals like changing our Torah covers from regal colors to pure white, courses for adults and classes for our children, we are deep in the process of planning for a wonderful new year. Hopefully, you have renewed your membership and enrolled your children in our religious school. So many wonderful activities, events, and programs await you. Under the leadership of our Director of Lifelong Learning, Alyson Morrissey, our school is thriving and growing, not only in numbers, but in engagement and joy.

As a congregation, our growth is palpable too. We just had a fun pool party and Back to Shul event where we saw old friends and made new ones. Our holiday observances continue to be at capacity. An incredible number of individuals are choosing Judaism as their way of life, identity, and practice. And we look forward to coming together and strengthening all of these parts of our congregation during our extraordinary High Holiday services culminating in a wonderful communal Havdalah and Break the Fast. We have so much good to look forward to and can't wait to share all of it with you.

So we offer these words found in Mishkan HaLev: Prayers for S'lichot and the Month of Elul: Now is the time for Turning . . . Turn us around, God, and bring us back toward You. Revive our lives, as at the beginning. And turn us toward each other—for in isolation there is no life.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

In many Jewish communities, it is customary to make a special tzedakah appeal during Yom Kippur as a tangible expression of a commitment to better oneself and help others during the year. This is not the practice at Ohef Sholom. I am a bit hesitant to make the ask in my High Holiday remarks, although a few congregants strongly encourage it. I am not hesitant to make the appeal here!

I am filled with gratitude for the generous support of OST by members who have given above the standard dues this year and in previous years as Pillars of the Temple. This support is so important to the Temple's ability to meet the budget requirements, while being inclusive of all who seek to fully participate in our OST community. Additionally, these gifts support engagement programs for needs within our OST community and beyond our Temple family as an expression of tikkun olam (repairing the world). We owe an enormous debt of gratitude to members, including those who are no longer with us, for giving generously to the Ohef Sholom Foundation (OSF) and the Tidewater Jewish Foundation (TJF) through the establishment of funds or pledged legacy gifts. We think of our beloved Kurt Rosenbach, of blessed memory, who wisely shepherded our Temple in an endowment campaign and in the creation of OSF to ensure that Ohef Sholom continues to thrive for many years to come. We have made significant progress since then, but more is needed. The partnership between our Congregation and the TJF offers guidance for making lasting gifts according to

individual's or family's ability to contribute. Charlie Nusbaum, the new OSF President, Vice President Matthew Fine, and other members of OSF and the Temple Board of Directors are available to speak to you about the opportunities. Our TJF partners, both OST members, Naomi Sedek, President and CEO, and Amy Weinstein, TJF's Development Strategist, are always available to help you establish a plan that works for you.

Perhaps the "annual appeal" is found in our High Holiday liturgy where there are references to tzedakah and a commitment to future generations. The Vidui prayer emphasizes collective responsibility. The Kedusha states, "We will teach Your greatness l'dor vador—from generation to generation. And to the end of time we will affirm Your greatness." This suggests the responsibility to provide a continuity of faith to future generations. Each generation provides the foundation for enduring vibrancy of our faith and heritage. A recurring conclusion to the recitation of Avinu Malkeinu suggests that we save our lives through "compassion, generosity and justice."

May you have a sweet New Year filled with happiness, love and prosperity!

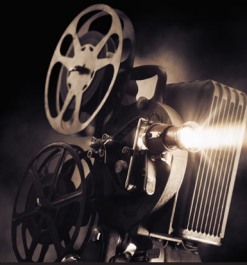

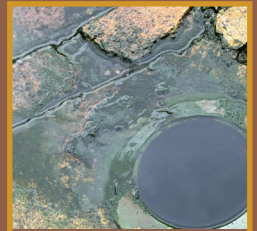


Leeks have Jewish connections through the Bible and traditions

With only a little time spent in a garden or nature, fast and slow change can be observed. While natural change occurs independently, people-made changes can have a profound effect on the environment.

Rain falls, winds blow, land erodes and moves reshaping the landscape. These natural phenomena form the land and sea which continue to be reshaped due to both natural and man-made action.

A seed grows into a plant which eventually may produce seed or spores to reproduce. Plants clean the air, provide oxygen, can become useful products, provide food and habitat, and help protect the earth from the sun. Eventually the plants and animals die and once again turn back into nutrients, contributing to the cycle of change.

that hatches in a few days into a caterpillar. For 7 to 10 days the caterpillar eats, grows, and sheds its skin preparing for change. This time it will become a chrysalis and hang by several silk threads for 7 to 10 days going through metamorphosis when it emerges as a butterfly.

Seven and ten days are significant in Judaism. Seven days in a week, Ten Commandments and Ten Days of Awe are examples. During the Ten Days of Awe, we are asked to consider

our lives and make changes that improve us and heal relationships that we have. Resolving to take better care of our planet could be part of the changes you make. To encourage the congregation to consider environmental issues, ideas from OST members will be posted for 10 days on Facebook. Feel free to share your own ideas.

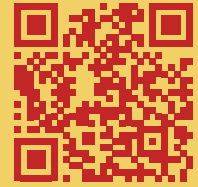

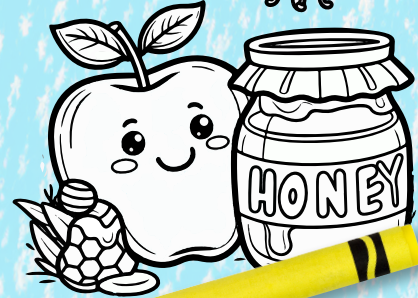

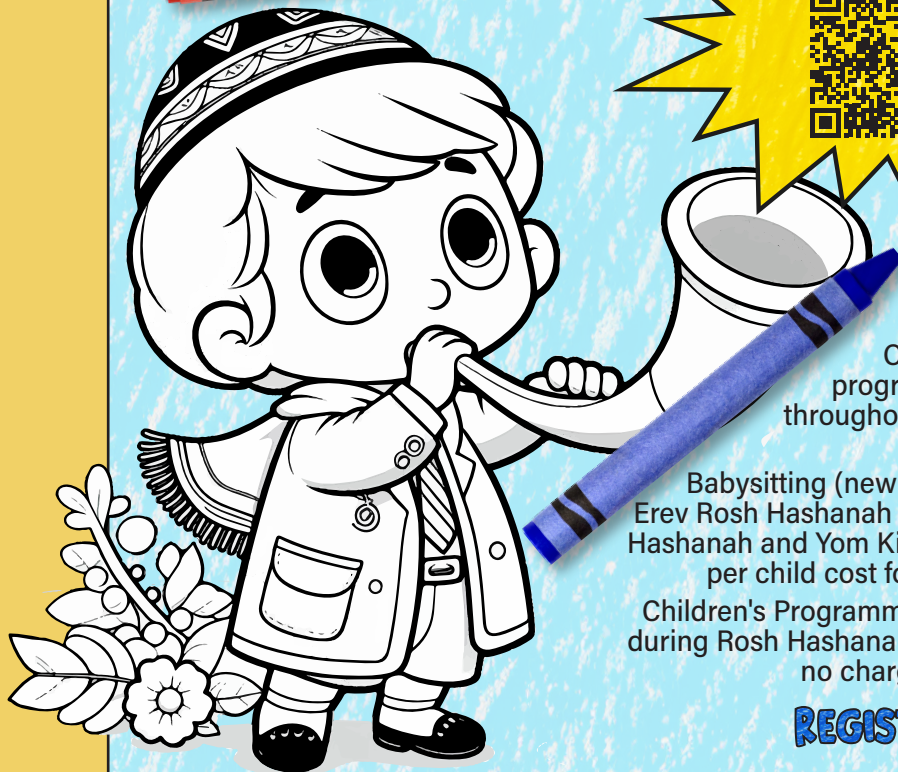
CHILDRENS PROGRAMMING AND BABYSITTING

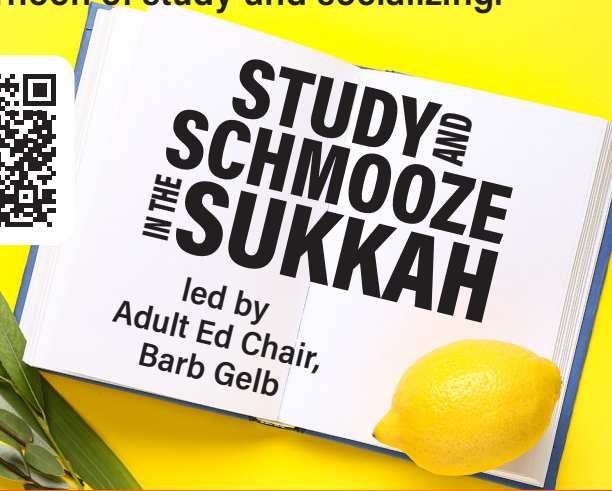

When the Schools Closed: Rabbi Malcolm Stern and the Opposition to Massive Resistance

Malcolm Henry Stern is remembered as an outstanding rabbi, a scholar of American Jewish history, and as the dean of American Jewish Genealogy (among other things). However, as a new school year begins, it seems fitting to also remember his opposition to the 1958 policy that closed six Norfolk public schools and interrupted the education of 10,000 students.

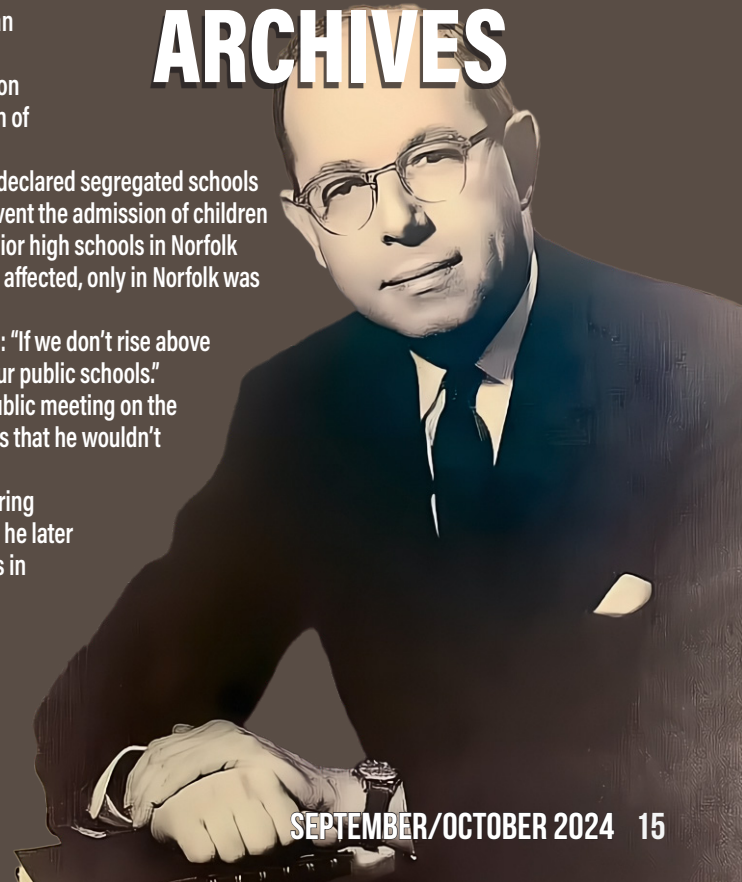
Virginia and other Southern states opposed the 1954 Supreme Court decision that declared segregated schools unconstitutional. Virginia reacted by instituting "Massive Resistance," a policy to prevent the admission of children of color in previously all-white schools. In September 1958, three junior and three senior high schools in Norfolk were closed to block the admission of 17 children of color. Although other cities were affected, only in Norfolk was virtually an entire secondary school system shut down.

Stern had long worked with interracial groups to oppose segregation and had said: "If we don't rise above our partisan feelings of segregation versus integration, we'll have disintegration in our public schools." Even before September, he wrote to Norfolk's mayor and city council, requesting a public meeting on the subject. And he continued to quietly oppose the closures, while assuring congregants that he wouldn't risk retaliation in light of the October 1958 bombing of an Atlanta temple.

He was not alone among Norfolk's clergy in being hesitant to endorse hosting tutoring sessions for the affected students, fearing it would actually prolong the closures. But he later agreed that it was a necessary expedient, and children of all faiths attended sessions in OST until the schools reopened in February 1959.

When Stern left Norfolk in 1964, newspaper editorials praised his integration efforts, and as we mark 30 years since his passing, we can take pride in remembering this OST rabbi who truly embodied the spirit of tikkun olam.

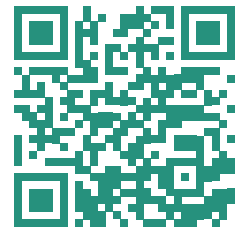
