FROM THE CLERGY

The beginning of a new year always brings with it a time of both reflection and anticipation.

We take a look back at all that has transpired – milestones, achievements, disappointments, and perhaps regrets. At the same time, we look forward to an unknown future, perhaps with excitement, or resolve, or trepidation.

A powerful teaching from Midrash Tanchuma, Beshalach 1 offers us a lens through which to view this tension. The Israelites, newly freed from Egypt, found themselves at the edge of the Sea of Reeds, trapped between Pharaoh’s pursuing army and the vast waters ahead. Looking back, they saw the looming danger of their oppressors; looking forward, they faced the seemingly impossible task of crossing the sea.

Just then, a leader named Nachshon ben Aminadav stepped forward. According to the midrash, he did not wait for reassurance or certainty. Instead, with faith and determination, he waded into the sea, walking deeper and deeper until the waters parted. Nachshon’s courage turned a moment of paralysis into one of possibility. In just a moment, the Israelites went from trembling on the shore of the sea to singing and dancing in the midst of the parted sea. It was a miracle beyond their imagination, born of the courage to take the first step.

This midrash reminds us that while looking back can teach us important lessons, it is looking forward

with determination and hope that enables us to move ahead. The past may feel like it’s pressing in on us, and the future may seem murky or even impossible. Yet, like Nachshon, we are called to take that first step—even when the way forward is unclear.

As a community, we can draw inspiration from Nachshon’s leap of faith. Whether we are confronting personal challenges, striving for justice, or simply navigating the complexities of daily life, we have the power to turn fear into action and uncertainty into progress.

This year, let us commit to walking boldly into the waters of the unknown, trusting that our steps—guided by faith, resilience, and the support of our community—will lead to paths of possibility and hope.

May 2025 be a year of courage and optimism, a year in which we move forward together toward renewal and growth.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

Our Past and Our Future

The month of January gets its name from the Roman god, Janus, an iconic image portrayed with two faces--one facing the past, and one facing the future. In Roman mythology, Janus is said to have been the "god of transitions and dualities," holding a key symbolizing the protection of doors, gates and thresholds, and among many things, known as an initiator between stages of life and shifts from one historic era to another.

This got me thinking about how past experiences guide our present and future as a Community—for the better.

As President, I share with others the priority to recruit younger leadership for the Temple Board and its Committees and projects, and I am thrilled to see younger members volunteer to lead in a variety of ways. We are enlightened by, and regularly embrace, their ideas for improving their Board or Committee experiences and supporting our Temple community. We also honor those who have volunteered for decades in the past and currently play a vital role in leading our Community. They continue to provide a depth of experience and invaluable institutional knowledge for which we are grateful.

The COVID-19 pandemic abruptly brought Ohef Sholom into the 21st Century. We talked about optional virtual worship for years. Faced with no alternative, and with some trial and error, we achieved a successful way to worship, provide education and conduct social events. Zoom continues to keep us connected. For many, it is now a preferred way to conduct Temple business or plan events. The efficiency and convenience of not having to add drive time or leave one's

office or home is not going away! Attendance at worship services has significantly increased and is more inclusive of those who cannot easily attend in person. Hebrew tutoring on Zoom for Religious School students has proven to be a very effective way to learn Hebrew.

We should be very proud of the many volunteers and the staff who continually find new ways to build community for our Temple family through inclusive educational and social events. While the classical Reform traditions which some of us love continue, our Clergy have successfully offered more family and multigenerational approaches to worship. We strive to exemplify kindness, justice and compassion, as commanded in the Torah, recited in our worship liturgy and observed at Passover, that our slavery in Egypt is central to our Jewish identity and should always remind us of the right way to treat others. This historical memory undergirds the concept of tikkun olam—our responsibility to repair the world. Our Clergy and Engagement Committee, chaired by Carol Brum, offers a variety of ways to express our kindness, justice and compassion to our Community within and in the broader community.

Looking backwards to learn and marching forward into 2025, may we go from strength to strength! I wish you a happy, healthy, safe and joyous New Year!

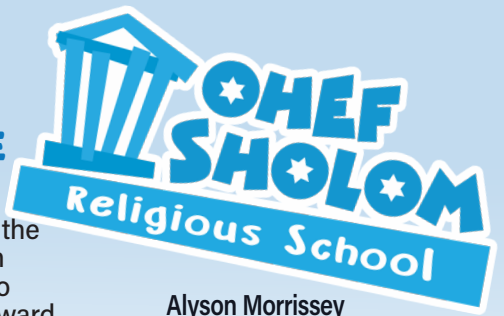

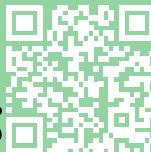

Why History? Why Archives?

The OST archive contains more than 100 boxes of documents, photographs, and media that chronicle the 180-year history of this congregation and the Jewish presence in Tidewater Virginia.

Recently, I was asked why it's important to preserve this history - or any history. I'm reminded of the story of Mark Twain's 1898 Harper's Magazine article in which Twain implied that, though patriotic, Jews were seen as having "an unpatriotic disinclination to stand by the flag as a soldier." The article drew a quick response, backed up by statistics, from American Jewish historian Simon Wolf. Wolf informed Twain that, in fact, per capita, more Jews had served in America's four wars than had their Christian fellow citizens. Twain, to his credit, published a second article in which he both apologized for and corrected his previous statement.

So why is history important... particularly Jewish history? Why preserve the record of Tidewater Jewish history? The answer is simple: if we don't tell our story, who will, and will it be correct.

It is impossible to accurately recount the history of health care, economic development, education, or culture in Tidewater without including the contributions of the Tidewater Jewish community. It is impossible to accurately tell the stories of events that traumatized this region - including pandemics and political and social upheavals -- without including the Jewish individuals and groups that contributed to overcoming their ill effects. It is impossible to think of the efforts to combat unfair housing, the needs of immigrant families, widespread hunger, and homelessness without including the efforts of the Jewish institutions of Tidewater.

But it is only through preserving the primary sources that record that history in words and pictures, that this history will accurately be told. And that is the purpose and the goal of the archive at OST.

The Mitzvah Committee recently completed three projects that benefitted Jewish Family Services. The first one was their annual Thanksgiving Basket Drive. Thanks to the generosity of our Religious School students, their families, and some of our congregants we were able to provide 25 bags for their drive. The bags included mashed potatoes, gravy, stuffing, marshmallows, cream of mushroom soup, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, mac n cheese, corn muffin mix and canned green beans.

Our second project involved the congregation and Sisterhood. Together we purchased and collected \$4750 worth of gift cards that will be distributed to 12-19 year olds. This will truly brighten their Holiday Season!

Finally, the Sisterhood, Religious School and Mitzvah Committee supplied Jewish Family Services with 100 goodie bags for local seniors. Each gift bag contains a box of Hanukkah cookies, gelt and a dreidel. We are helping to make a difference in our local community. We sincerely appreciate everyone's support in our efforts.

The Mitzvah Committee Co-Chairs had the pleasure of representing our Temple at the Community Impact Day, which was held at the Jewish Community Center on Sunday, November 24th.

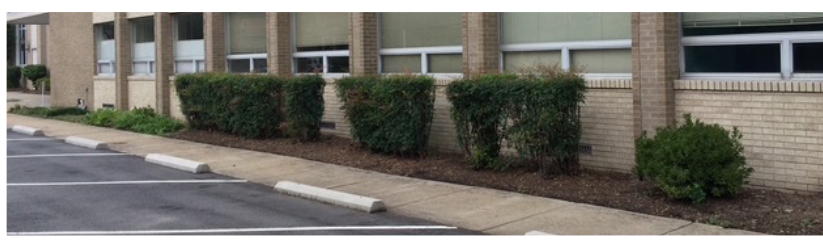

- Complete a booklet about the trees at OST.

Working in the garden may leave us with dirty hands, but we also leave feeling awe for G-d's creation.

We had a wonderful time celebrating with our OSTY teens and sharing in the joy of Hanukkah. We can't wait to do it all again next year!



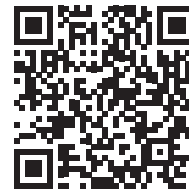
