# PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

There are many reasons to look forward to March and April. It is Spring! You won't want to miss our very talented Cantor Jen's Purimshpiel production of a Wicked Wicked Man on March 13 and please consider supporting the OSTY sponsored Purim Carnival on March 9. Passover is an opportunity to enjoy family and community seders with good food and rituals so central to who we are as Jews.

Purim's and Passover's themes of oppression, survival, redemption, hope and resilience have been very much on my mind as Bill and I visited Jewish communities in Buenos Aires, Argentina and Montevideo, Uruguay in February. The personal stories of our guides as children or descendants of immigrants from Russia, Germany and Eastern Europe escaping pogroms, poverty and the Holocaust and their embrace of community, worship and ritual and Jewish education despite ongoing challenges were inspirational.

The Buenos Aires Jewish community, now the third largest Jewish population in the Western Hemisphere after the US and Canada, has endured overwhelming antisemitic violence, loss of life and injuries. At least 6% of the 330,000 Jewish population were among the 30,000 citizens who "disappeared" at the hand of the military junta that ruled between 1976 and 1983. The suicide bombing of the Israeli embassy in 1992 killed 29 people (25 Argentinians) and wounded many more. This was followed two years later by the horrific car bombing of the vibrant AMIA Jewish Community Center, killing 85 (including Christians) and wounding 300. It has been 31 years since the AMIA bombing, but the scars and loss remain. No arrests were ever made in either bombing, though the Argentine government blamed Hezbollah. Since the 1980s, thousands of Argentine Jews have made Aliyah to Israel and many others emigrated to the US and other countries.

Our 21 year old guide at AMIA spoke movingly - and proudly - of the determination and resiliency of her community. Rather than finding a new location, AMIA defiantly rebuilt on the same location and continues to welcome non-Jews to join in the use of the beautiful replacement facility. A heavily damaged portion of the original building has been preserved and integrated into

the new center as a moving memorial to those who perished, but that employs vibrant colors and extensive symbolism to exemplify hope and resiliency.

Our guide in Montevideo and I shared observations about the increased antisemitism since Hamas attacked Israel on Oct 7, 2023. Both Montevideo's and Buenos Aires' Jewish institutions visited are heavily fortified, yet Uruguay, with its long history of secular government, has demonstrated consistent support of the Jews. The 15,000 Jews are represented by their own board who "has the ear of the government." In 1995, the President of Uruguay announced that a Holocaust memorial should be built in a prominent waterfront location on the Rio de la Plata and shepherded the plan through the Parliament. It was dedicated in 2000 with 100 Holocaust survivors, including Elie Wiesel, present. There is not space to describe fully this moving memorial, but it includes a symbolic reference to the sea parting for the Israelites to cross to freedom and the welcoming of immigrants. Our guide was proud that to this day, Uruguay accepts immigrants escaping oppression, mostly from other South American countries.

As we joyfully celebrate Purim and Passover together, let us appreciate our freedom and security, remember those who are not free, and rededicate our efforts to care for the oppressed, because "we were once slaves in Egypt."

# Recent Poll Reveals American Ignorance about the Holocaust



Last year, an American Jewish Committee public opinion survey revealed that only 53% of American adults knew that six million Jews were killed in the Holocaust. Documents in the OST archives clearly show what Americans knew about the Holocaust at the time it happened. One way of correcting the discrepancy is by preserving documentary evidence in archives like ours.

Bertram S. Nusbaum, long-time congregant and future congregation president, was secretary of the Norfolk United Jewish Fund during the Holocaust, and his papers are preserved in the OST Archives. The UJF raised money for Jewish causes -- locally, in the U.S., and abroad. They clearly show that information about the Holocaust was widely known as early as 1939.

In a June 20, 1939 telegram, sent prior to the invasion of Poland and onset of WWII, the president of American ORT pleaded for additional funds in the face of "pressing European demands."

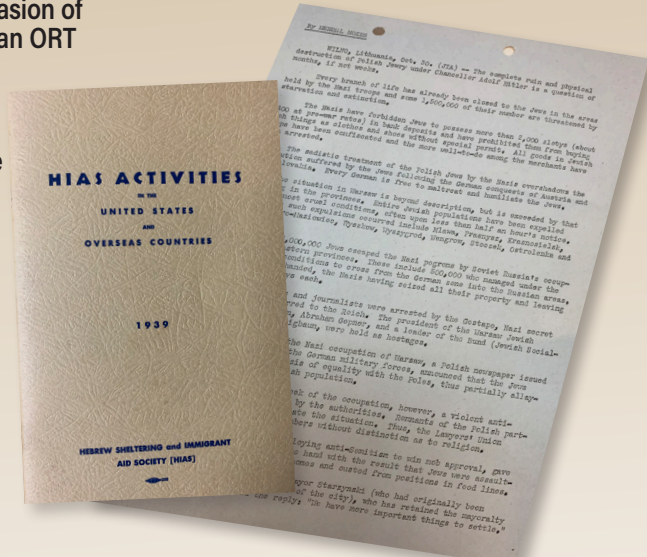
An October 1939 Jewish Telegraphic Agency article by the chief of the Warsaw bureau sent to the UJF graphically described the confiscation of Jewish property, widespread starvation, forced labor, mass executions, and the establishment of what may have been the first Polish concentration camp.

A February 1940 letter from the UJA requested that Norfolk radio station WTAR broadcast a national program in which author Thomas Mann, a refugee from Nazi Germany, was speaking about the plight of European Jewry.

A March 1940 HIAS report wrote of "Jewish men, women, and children . . . ruthlessly and savagely being subjected to the cruelest and most inhuman processes of extermination" in all the occupied territories.

Americans knew about the Holocaust then, but that knowledge seems to have been short-lived. Documentary evidence can play a role in reversing that trend. Soon, some of that documentary evidence will be on display in Simon Hall.

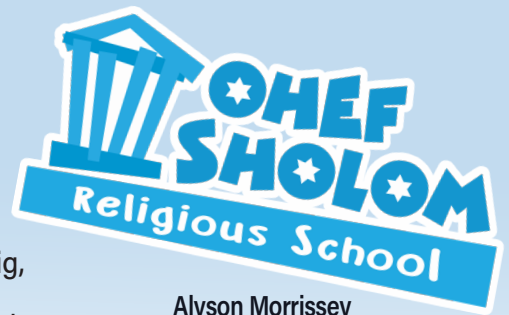

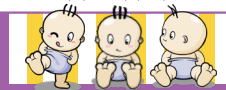

## Spring Seed Planting Time

Seeds have been the inspiration for metaphors such as hope, growth, and change. Expressions like, "Plant a Seed"; "seed money", "bad seed" or this gardening reminder, "One year's seeds make seven years weeds.", have been created. Seeds are not only used to start new plants, they are also a food source like the sesame seed bun and are used in the making of many products.

So many seeds, so many choices, and so many decisions to make about what to plant in a garden, yard, flower pot, or water garden. One of the first considerations is whether or not this plant is good for the environment. Most native plants are good choices.

Other considerations for planting are:

- Will the plant fit the space?
- Does the space meet the light, water, and soil requirements of the plant?
- Will it become a problem plant in the future by aggressive growth or reseeding?
- Is it a good choice for plant hardiness in Zones 8A and B?
- What do you want the plant to do? Is it for food, flowers, shade, etc.

Sometimes well intentioned people have decided that a plant will be useful and introduced a plant like Kudzu or developed the Bradford Pear. These poor decisions have left us with problems that will last for generations. Just because a plant or seeds are at a nursery doesn't mean that it is a good plant to use in your garden.

In Jewish tradition we are expected to plant seeds that can grow into an actual plant or a tradition, value, or idea. Each seed holds hope for the future survival of its' species. We must ensure that the environment of the future can sustain the growth required to Heal the World, Tikkun Olam.

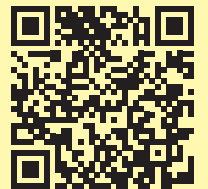

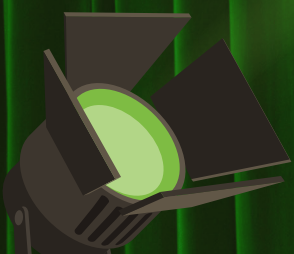
